



Ross Egan 10 on me

This presentation demonstrated the value of our 10 on me, Ross told us about a skill he has, and we were total unaware!

"In January 2012 my children presented me with a week at the National Art School – Summer School – at old Darlinghurst Goal.

The classes available ranged from still life, nude, digital photography, animals at the Zoo, sculpture, oils, and I chose 'Sydney Harbour landscapes', which included special lectures and tours to Garden Island & Cockatoo Island. There were about 10 people in the class, held in a well lit refurbished cell block.

Our lady teacher is a experienced, energetic professional artist with lots of passion and fiery Russian forebears.

The other pupils ranged from a lawyer from Darwin, a teacher from Wagga, a botanical artist, a professional artist, an advertising graphics man, and several mums & dads. We had such fun that a year later our group continues to meet monthly to paint around Sydney Harbour.

We supply our art materials – so shopping is an experience in itself.

As a civil engineer, my painting experience had been limited to school days, painting new buildings/bridges and scribbling structural ideas on serviettes at the dinner table.

We started by learning a little about colour & the rules of tone (e.g. warm or cold), depth of colour/ complementary colours etc, BUT soon learnt that this was not to be a 'normal art class' where we painted the scene/photograph as we see it! The challenges began on the first day!

For the whole week, we were to draw & paint using only the 'left side of our brains!' What does this mean?

For example:-

- Colour - this approach (LSOOB) demands the use of complementary colours. To best demonstrate this try focus hard on a block of blue colour for at least 10 seconds, then divert your eyes slightly, you will see yellow (the other side of your brain) . And vice versa, yellow block produces blue! Try it some time.
- So black becomes white, and so on, with all colours having an opposite, equally pleasing to the eye, but quite unexpected if you are simply looking for a 'photographic' painting.
- Advertising industry makes much use of opposite (attractive) colours – without us realising the trick being played on our brains e.g. MacDonald's red & yellow.
- Shape – apparently it is quite common in the advertising graphics to draw the 'negative space' rather than the actual object – so many famous business logos are created using this concept to ping on our brain.


- So in practice to draw the branches of a tree, you draw the shape of the space between the branches, and gradually develop the whole branch network in this fashion, with the result being more effective/ much easier than trying draw each branch. to 'see' these spaces. Try it sometime with a The challenge is to get the left side of our brain
- Composition – every scene can be modified to improve on nature and create a better 'picture' – this simply requires the artist to define the main components/ shapes and create a balanced picture. This means that the result can often be a combination of many parts of the whole scene- as the attached drawing of the artist studio shows- <<3020_001.pdf>> and the result is a better picture of something we all would recognise.

The 'LSOOB' concept presents many challenges for most of us used to responding literally to what they see – (e.g. a botanical artist used to forensically drawing birds & flowers or a photographer) and has been used by famous artists throughout history. So next time you are in an art gallery in Europe – look for it! Look it up on your web or buy a book.

This series of art classes, although stressful sometimes, caught my interest because the results are totally unexpected, and yet interesting for the viewer.

I encourage everyone to have a hobby such as painting/ drawing, and give your brain the challenge. "

He built and flew model aeroplanes.




