
Gordon Market

Board position vacant - Filling The Gap

Filling the Gap is a not for profit organisation which recruits dentists to work in Aboriginal communitycontrolled health services where access to dental treatment is limited or non-existent and where there is, consequently, much need.

The organisation needs a person with a legal, administrative or business background to join its volunteer board of directors. The ideal person is a retired or semiretired individual with an interest in volunteering and public interest.

The position entails chairing board meetings, which take place once every two months, and communicating and liaising at a higher level with Aboriginal peak bodies (state and federal) and government officials (state and federal).

The amount of work involved is quite small, as the bulk of the heavy work (recruitment of dentists and dental staff, working directly with, and visiting and monitoring Aboriginal communities, liaising with the dental fraternity, and many routine matters) is done by other board members. Last week's speaker



Rob Hall How Rotary made me eat a horse

Rob talked about the way experiences provided by Rotary,

such as RYLA, had shaped some important aspects of his later life. One of these was triggering an intense interest in what he called, "getting backstage". By way of explanation, he described going to New Zealand on a Rotary student exchange. In New Zealand, Rotarian families in both the North and South Island hosted him. In Rotorua, he stayed with a Maori family. When he arrived at their home he was, as he said, "welcomed by a delightful family in t-shirts and jeans who sat around chatting to him over a beer or two." However, the next morning when he went to breakfast, the family was sitting around in their traditional costume eating their cornflakes. He wondered if he should have "dressed for breakfast". It turned out that the family were part of a group under contract to perform for tourists. After the perfomance, they returned to their "normal life and normal clothes". At that moment, Rob said that he decided that while the performance had been a valid experience for the tourists who probably left feeling that they had a window into Maori culture, seeing both sides of the Maori experience and being "back stage" seemed so much richer.

This experience occurred while he was working as an engineering trainee with BHP in Newcastle (his city of origin). The company was very supportive of his desire to transition from being an engineer to training in psychology. As, he said, he became more interested in understanding issues such as why accidents occurred and how to design better control panels than how heavy the electrical supply cable for the rolling mills needed to be.

Rob's career in psychology took him into the university environment where he taught psychology and gained his PhD. His interest in research methods led him to teach in schools of psychology, environmental studies and marketing at universities in Australia, China and most recently, in Verona, Italy.

It was in Verona that his interest in the wartime history of Italy developed and while there he noticed a book about the destruction of historic Verona and its subsequent restoration to the beautiful UNESCO classified city it is today. He bought the book and discovered that it was the product of a local Rotary project. He contacted the club to find out more about the book. This year, on his and Adrienne's 6th visit to the city, and in his role as a self-described "Rotary newbie", he made contact with the club again and the club officers took Adrienne and Rob to a splendid restaurant for a "typical Veronese meal". As they already knew, the Veronese are notorious amongst other Italian regions for their passion for eating horse and ass meat. When the huge plate of bollito misto (mixed boiled meats) arrived, Rob found himself chewing his way through delicacies such as boiled tendon and whole tongues. Rotary really had made him eat a horse.
