Rotary Youth Leadership Award


Have you got your nomination of a candidate for a Rotary Youth Leadership Award in? Do it this week or you'll miss the deadline!

Chris Golis Practical Emotional Intelligence: The secret of Leadership

Chris is a graduate of Cambridge University and the London Business

School. After successful careers in IT and venture capital, where he was the director of some 30 private and public companies, Chris is now engaged in a Third Age career as professional speaker and workshop leader, based on his eleven published books positioning himself as Australia's expert in practical emotional intelligence.

Chris began his talk by asking the audience which of eight characteristics defined the successful leader: adaptability to change, ethics, intelligence, people skills, self-management, strategic thinking, team player, or vision. People skills was the most popular characteristic. Chris then argued that the best way of improving your people skills was to use a practical and valid personality profiling tool. Practically the ideal system should contain seven components, as that is the limit of short term memory, and it also should agree with the latest advances in personality theory.

Chris then described his emotional intelligence journey. In early 1973 his London Business School tutor, Charles Handy, advised him to turn down a job offer from the New York office of McKinsey and instead become a salesperson as that would teach him the people skills which an MBA fails to do. Following the advice, Chris emigrated to Australia in late 1973 and soon became a trainee computer systems salesperson for ICL. There he learnt about the Humm-Wadsworth model of temper-

ament, which he used very successfully in selling and management.

In 1995 Daniel Goldman published *Emotional Intelligence*

which promoted the concept that emotional intelligence (EQ) was more important than natural intelligence (IQ) in determining success in life. His book defined what EQ is and why it is important but

failed to describe a way of how you could improve your EQ because he did have a theory of core emotions like the Humm. Chris decided he would write the sequel to *Emotional Intelligence* but was side-tracked for 12 years when he was offered \$20 million by St. George Bank to set up a venture capital fund. Finally, pushed by his daughter, he wrote the sequel in 2007.

Chris then explained the Humm-Wadsworth model, which contains seven components, and used Tony Abbott, Woody Allen, Penelope Cruz, Julia Gilliard, the Big Bang Theory characters, Donald Trump, and John Howard as examples. He then showed how the five most common Humm components matched the Five Factor theory, which is latest and most valid model in Personality Theory.

Chris then explained how a major weakness in most profiling tools is the failure to recognise corporate psychopaths and demonstrated how Myer-Briggs destroyed Arthur Andersen. He then used Pfeffer's leadership model to show how the ideal leader combines the Mover, Hustler, and Politician Components and used Bill Clinton and Bob Hawke as examples.

Chris concluded by saying people drive performance, emotions drive people, and temperament drives emotions. The problem is most people do not have a scientifically valid model of temperament to help them determine their own and other people's core emotions and that most practical temperament tool available, the Humm-Wadsworth, can dramatically lift your emotional intelligence.

ShelterBox Australia

The past month has illustrated the never-ending need for emergency shelter and highlighted the dangers faced by aid workers around the world. As agencies struggle to cope with the tens of thousands fleeing the fighting in Iraq and Syria, ShelterBox Australia mourns the death of British aid worker, David Haines, murdered by ISIL extremists. Alan worked for relief agency, **ACT-ED**, one of one of ShelterBox's partners in the Middle East.

DEPLOYMENTS

Zimbabwe - Floods

In March of this year, ShelterBox sent tents to assist families forced from their homes by flooding in Masvingo Province. ShelterBox worked with IOM to distribute aid but had some



tent stocks remaining which were kept safe by IOM in their logistics warehouse. The remaining 303 in-country tent stocks have now been distributed in a new area, overseen by SRT members, Liz Odell (UK) and Richard Loat (CAN). 39 SchoolBoxes have also been delivered to the Chingwizi resettlement site.

Mexico - Hurricane



Hurricane Odile (a category 3 hurricane) made landfall on the Baja peninsula on 15/09/2014, damaging infrastructure and causing some flooding. Working with Red Cross and local Rotary

contacts, SRT volunteers, Derek Locke and Yi Shun Lai (both US) have identified 500 families needing assistance in the Los Cabos area and shelter repair kits will be provided in the near future.

Nepal - Flooding

Earlier this month, communities along the Nepal-China border were submerged by rising floodwater. It is now estimated that as many as 19 districts are currently underwater across the mountainous country. The Response Team is currently divided between Kathmandu (logistics) and Surkhet (overseeing distribution). Needs assessments in the Bardiya area are underway. The team is also look-



ing into the feasibility of deploying shelter repair kits alongside conventional ShelterBoxes to help meet shelter needs. Distribution of the first shipment of 224 boxes began last weekend.

Iraq - Conflict

The rapid advance of militant fighters has thrown Iraq into crisis and has now led to overseas involvement in the form of aid interventions. ShelterBox has preposi-



tioned stock in Iraq and will be working with ACTED to establish a camp to provide shelter for internally displaced people (IDP's). There are around 1,900 tents in Iraq Kurdistan, of which approxi-

mately 600 have recently been distributed. Deployment of the remaining tents is awaiting resolution of various practical issues such as land ownership.

Pakistan and the Philippines

The operations team have been approached by several agencies in Pakistan in the wake of severe flooding and conflict in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province. ShelterBox is now working with the Pakistan Army, the NDMA and one other agency to distribute 496 tents in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province. It is also monitoring developments on the Philippine island of Luzon where volcanic activity at Mount Mayon has led to the evacuation of over 54,000 residents in recent days. The operations team is speaking to in-country contacts, including IOM and Rotary about government evacuation plans in the event of an eruption. Discussions continue.

Rotary Leadership Institute
