President Tony:

- Welcomed our guest speaker, Phil Morley, our Rotary Youth Leadership Award nominee, Deb Jordan, Ariana Chong, Nurani Krishnan, Kat Hastenteufel, Stan Glaser, Chris Lewis and David Hepworth;
- Welcomed back Loïc Lacombe;
- Described his experience of Presentation Day at Clarke Road School (see last week's Koongga), recommended that all members visit the school to see the wonderful work being done by the staff and announced that:


In order to improve her first aid knowledge and skills, Deb is also a member of St Johns Ambulance.

Phil Morley Car rallying in Australia

My interest in car rallying started with my older brother Bruce, who joined the MG Car Club Newcastle and started competing in 1964. His stories of adventures in rallies and trials sparked my enthusiasm. Although I was still at school, I couldn't wait till I was able to compete. The opportunity came in 1968, when I was able to contest as rally as a navigator.



In those times, the events were essentially map reading exercises, using Army maps with grid references. Although banned by the authorities in 1969, rallies were again back on in 1970 and were again very popular. It was not unusual

for a rally starting in Sydney, say at Top Ryde, to have 250 entries.

Once I started working, I was able to buy a car and I also started driving. Cars in those times were still very standard. Extra lights, sump guards and stiffer springs and shock absorbers were



the main modifications. Because I had very little money, I learnt how to prepare and fix my car between events. It was also my everyday mode of transport, so I couldn't afford to damage it.

My passion was intense when it came to rallies and so I got into the organising side as well. I became a Confederation of Australian Motor Sport Director and checker of events as well as a member of the Rally Advisory


Committee. I become involved in the organising of the 1977 London to Sydney Rally, won by Andrew Cowan.

Once married, the need for my salary to go towards a house meant that I no longer could afford to compete as a driver, so I went back to co-driving. By this time the rallies were starting to change their nature. The map reading was being replaced by route charted events, which meant that the fastest car on the special stages became the winner. The special stages were mainly in

forest, with transport stages joining the special stages. Cars were also changing. Engines were being modified to produce more power, larger brakes fitted and roll cages fitted inside to protect the occupants.



I again returned to driving in the 1980s, as well as codriving, organising (I directed a number of State Championship events north of Newcastle) and preparing cars for competition. Turbo charged, four wheel drive cars came along in the early 80's and I again saw that I could not compete in the way I would have liked, so I again dropped out of competing as a driver. I remarked 'I haven't run out of talent, I have just run out of money'.



I then joined up with a driver who had a VL Commodore, the specifications of which were similar to the same type of cars running in the Bathurst 1000s of the time. We had numerous successes in this car, winning our class in the Australian Rally Championship. He then sold this car and purchased a Group A Mitsubishi Lancer Evo 3. Again we competed with success in this car over a number of years. We placed in the top 3 a number of times in the State Championship.

My current involvement in rallying extends to the organising side and in particular a scoring system based on an Excel spreadsheet. Most rallies currently conducted in NSW use a system developed by me.
