ROMAC receives assistance from medical experts, hospitals, nurses, physiotherapists, pathology and radiology services, airlines, sponsors and other supporters.

40 year Group Study Exchange



Lindsay May writes that our District (then District 968) had a Group Study Exchange team visit the USA in 1975.

The team has held a reunion every year since and just had their 40th with all six members present.

Former Rotarian Colin Williams (Vice President,

Wyong in 1971, Charter President, Gosford North in 1972) reports:

In my 29 years of Rotary, I served District 268, 968, 9680 on many committees including G.S.E, District Attendance Officer, Club Service Advisor, International Service Advisor, and member Membership Development Committee.

In 1975, I was chosen as District 968 Governor's Representative (Team Leader) of the Group Study Team to District 769, North Carolina, U.S.A. This team had a highly successful exchange.

The team has held <u>at least one official meeting each</u> <u>year since</u>, and also have frequent contact and social arrangements with each other, plus ongoing communications with North Carolina, especially since emailing now makes this easy.

Each member of the team has revisited North Carolina at least 5 times, (one has been 18 times), and at last count, 16 families from North Carolina have visited Australia. The inter visits have now extended to the next two generations, with children even spending their honeymoon in the cousin country.

Recently, the team held its 40 year reunion at Q Station on the North Head of Sydney Harbour. Every member of the team, together with their wife / partner was present. Some even had and were able to fit their original green jackets !

A great time was had reminiscing, comparing notes and stories, and keeping up with events.

We believe this team is unique, and certainly fostered the aims of Peace, Goodwill, and Understanding.

Team member Richard Lawson and wife Sandy are visiting North Carolina in September to continue our claim and theme: "*The Exchange Goes On*".

Vocational Excellence Award nominations

The Rotary Awards for Vocational Excellence were inaugurated in 1982 by the Rotary District 9685 Vocational Service Committee. The first Awards were presented to three candidates at the 1983 District Conference in Bathurst by PDG Graham Turnidge.



The concept was accepted by the clubs of District 9685 in subsequent years as an integral part of their Vocational Service program.

The aims of the Award are:

- To recognise vocational excellence of the highest order and to honour outstanding contribution by individuals or small teams of individuals for significant advancement in their vocational field in Australia.
- To inspire further enthusiasm and to give added reward to the exceptional achievers.
- To set an example to others, particularly youth, of the need to strive for vocational excellence for the benefit of their discipline and Australia.

The District Vocational Excellence Committee has commenced the process of selecting awardees to be recognised at the 2016 Conference in Canberra. You may well know of a worthy candidate. If so, make sure our club completes the nomination by 31 October. Nominees should preferably reside and /or carry out their vocation within the boundaries of District 9685.

District 9685 funds Interplast team to Kiribati



Over the last two years, our Rotary District has raised over \$50,000 to fund an Interplast team. Last week D9685 Interplast Chair, David Hart was informed that the team funded by D9685 will go to Kirabati (pronounced "Kirabas") Interplast goes

there about every 18 months and takes two doctors, two anaesthetists, and two theatre sisters. The team will be led by Miklos Pohl who is a regular Interplast volunteer. The team will leave probably in the first half of next year.

And the news gets even better. D9685 will also fund a physiotherapist from Fiji to come to the Royal Hobart hospital for skill upgrading. She is coming to Hobart in the next few weeks.

Interplast sends a big thank you to all clubs in the district and particularly to those clubs who made a contribution.

Last week representatives of the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic organising team, led by Bob Elsworth, outlined the planning that is in progress for next year's event. Highlights included:

Changes for 2016

- No 11km family ride;
- 6.30 am (pre-sunrise) start for the 104km ride volunteers will need to start 30mins earlier!
- Route changes to improve safety in St Ives (Mudies Rd) and in Terrey Hills (McCarr's Creek Rd);
- Drink stop, at Ellis Trig Station this year, moved back

to Terrey Hills Thai;

- New website and back end registration/donation system;
- Cromehurst School in Lindfield, nominated by St Ives Rotary Club, is a new beneficiary. The school caters for students from age 4 to the completion of year 12 in the moderate to severe range of intellectual disability.
