This week: Archie Law: Action Aid



ActionAid Australia is a global movement of people working together to further human rights and defeat poverty for all. Its current campaigns include a movement to promote safe cities for women and helping women around the world stand up for their rights. It raises and applies funds for relief of poverty in the Middle East, Africa, Asia and Oceania.

Recently ActionAid publicised the injustice of multinational corporations avoiding tax in third world countries - precisely the places where payment of tax could do most good to alleviate the suffering of people. In his talk, Archie Law, Executive Director of ActionAid, will explain how the organisation wants to persuade governments worldwide to prevent such commercial practices.

Archie Law is a graduate of Monash University who has worked for the United Nations Department of Peace-keeping Operations in New York and the UN Development Program in South Africa. He led the Cambodian land mine removal program for 4 years and has also managed emergency relief projects for World Vision. In the 1980s he was the drummer for the rock band 'Huxton Creepers'.

Last week: Philip Smith: Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children

Philip has been a Rotarian for 14 years and has been a member of 4 Rotary clubs. He was presented with Paul Harris Recognition in 2004, for his work in the Rotary Club of Haber-field, NSW.



Philip and his wife Cathie, became involved in Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children ('ROMAC') when an 11 year old girl with congenital glauco-

ma came to Sydney for surgery in August 2010

ROMAC provides medical treatment for children from developing countries in the form of life saving and/or dignity restoring surgery not accessible to them in their home country.

ROMAC has been in operation for over 27 years. Rotarians volunteer their time and expertise to run this Rotary program that encompasses all the Districts of Australia and New Zealand. ROMAC is assisted by many eminent Australian and New Zealand surgeons who generously donate their time free for the treatment of the patients.

ROMAC has a Board of five members, plus an operations committee, which includes the Board members plus eight others responsible for operational activity. Australia and New Zealand is divided into six regions. Each of the regions has a regional committee, managed by the Regional Chair and including representatives from each of the Rotary districts in their region.

This humanitarian program has provided over 400 chil-

dren from 20 countries with urgent medical treatment that has given them new hope. To date, children have been brought from Fiji, Papua New Guinea, Malaysia, Indonesia



Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, Vietnam, Cambodia, Russia, China, Tonga, Solomon Islands, The Philippines, Pakistan, Iran, Timor-Leste, Vanuatu, Kiribati, Nauru and Zimbabwe. ROMAC has about 60 children on its waiting list at any given time.

The children usually come from very remote areas and are brought to Australia, as medical treatment is simply not available in their home countries. ROMAC has helped children with herniated brains, deformed limbs, horrific burns, heart conditions and, in the case of the Bosun (Siamese) twins, separation as they were joined face to face from the lower chest to the umbilicus.

Philip showed a short video about a Vietnamese girl with a huge facial tumour, which was preventing her eating. One Rotary club in Victoria raised \$80,000 for dental reconstruction surgery. The girl will have to return for further surgery as she grows. This is often the case, for example, with skin graft patients.



The children and their parents/guardians generally have no experience of things such as water on tap, toilets, electricity and car safety belts and they cannot understand things on television or the concept of surgery. All

these things have to be explained to them.

Philip said his presentation was not only to bring club members up to date on ROMAC's projects, but to also invite members who have a spare day or two to become volunteers, to accompany a child and one parent on a day out, such as visiting a hospital or visiting tourist spots in Sydney to entertain the visitors, as they usually don't spend all of their time in hospital. And of course to invite clubs to donate to ROMAC.

District caring for a ROMAC child and parent/guardian is a rewarding and satisfying family experience. A 17 year old girl from a remote part of the Solomon Islands is coming for heart surgery at the Adventist Hospital in Wahroonga soon. She and her mother will need accommodation out of the hospital for about 1 week.

Make a donation

Since ROMAC began in 1988, it has treated hundreds of deserving and underprivileged children. Only with your help can ROMAC change and save the lives of many, many more. It has expenses of about \$1million per annum and relies on donations and philanthropic support. Your donation goes directly to the aid of children in need. Refer a patient

Patients are referred to ROMAC through many different sources - Rotarians or friends-of-Rotary on holiday or projects overseas, other community service organisations, medical professionals on holiday or projects overseas and many others. Simply send in photos and ROMAC will arrange for local assessment of the patient, with the information gained sent for further assessment in Australia.

Run a fundraiser

A specific fundraiser for ROMAC for Rotary clubs including regions or cluster groups, community groups or any other organisation is a wonderful way to ensure the important work of ROMAC is allowed to continue. Fundraisers can be as simple as a community lunch with some entertainment or a larger project such as North Ryde's Carols on the Common or the Central Coast's Opera in the Park, which raised \$13,500 this year.

Next week: Shen Yun Performing Arts: Chinese artistic performers

Shen Yun Performing Arts, formerly known as Divine Performing Arts, is a performing-arts and entertainment company based in New York. It performs classical Chinese dance, ethnic and folk dance, and story-based dance, with orchestral accompaniment and solo performers. The Shen Yun website translates the phrase *shen yun* as "the beauty of divine beings dancing".

Shen Yun was founded in 2006 by practitioners of Falun Gong, the spiritual discipline, with the mission of reviving "the essence of 5000 years of Chinese culture", which it states to have been nearly destroyed by the Chinese government. Performances around the world are hosted by local Falun Dafa Associations.

The company is scheduled to perform again in Sydney in March 2016.


Travellers' tales
