Last week: Annabelle Chauncy: School For Life Foundation update



Annabelle Chauncy took time off her law studies to teach in Kenya for 3 months at her own expense - and never went back. Instead, despite being hospitalised with a waterborne virus in her first week in Africa and then being evacuated to Uganda when war broke out, she has devoted all her time since to changing lives in Uganda.

Being in Africa was an eye-opening experience. Uganda has 36 million people - half of them children. Children everywhere. 100 to a classroom, with 1 untrained teacher. It was overwhelming.

On the positive side, Annabelle was impressed by everyone trying to better themselves - even if that means so many minibuses (designed for 14 passengers, but carrying twice that, plus chickens and goats) that it takes 4 hours to drive out of the bus park!

And the people had huge smiles and an insatiable desire to learn. Annabelle taught them in an utterly basic classroom, with students falling asleep because they hadn't enough to eat.

Over drinks at the Greengate Hotel in Killara in 2008 Annabelle and her co-founder Dave Everett (whom she had met in Kenya) discussed how they could use their education to make a difference to others. And so the School For Life Foundation ('SFLF') was born.

3 years of research and development followed, including trips to Uganda. Annabelle and Dave learned how to work with the local community - giving a 'hand up', not a 'hand out'. The challenge was to 'upskill' the people - who might have no education, no job and 14 children.

In 2010 SFLF bought a site of 12.5 acres in Katuuso in an area with huge unemployment, lots of alcoholism and no school within 15km. Begging help from anywhere they could get it (for example with construction plans), stage 1 opened in January 2011, with 80 children. The local people named the school and gave it the motto 'Nezikookolima' - "every great rooster came from an egg".

Features of the school were positive, bright classrooms where the children feel supported and uniforms are provided. To overcome the malnourishment that made students sleepy, 3 nutritious meals are provided each day. And the water bore provides clean water for the whole community. Sports days involve entire families. Basic healthcare is provided, dealing with scourges such as malaria and HIV.

Due to the belief in witchcraft, disabled people are invisible in the community. But the school has made provision for them - for example a girl with Down syndrome and an epileptic whose fits have been reduced from 3 to 1 per day with medication.

SFLF now touches the lives of over 1,000 people, with an emphasis on 'upskilling'. Annabelle spoke of Rachel, a cleaner, who saved money from her wages in order to go to university. She is now a teacher and dean of studies at Katuuso.

Education for adults includes a literacy program and a display plot showing farmers how to progress from only planting maize to rotating various crops, earning them more money.

The solar power installation which our club helped fund powers lights, computers, fridges, freezers and sewing machines - the last enabling the women to make goods for sale and then save money. One, Rose, was abused by her husband and moved back to her parents' home, where there were 30 children. Rose saved money to pay for cataract surgery for her father and has subsequently been able to move out and live by herself.

SFLF is building 2 more schools - one primary and one secondary. They will enable 1,200 more children to go to school - now starting at the age of 3. The new schools require two 100,000 litre water tanks and will need solar power. The schools charge modest, manageable fees, which means that the parents value the education and, for example, don't keep children at home to help with the harvest. Because there are so many children, SFLF is unable to take all children from each family.

The Wahroonga Rotary Club joins forces with Community groups to provide *WELCOME PACKS* for 200 Refugee families due to arrive into NSW in early 2016



A Community Appeal was launched by **Ku-ring-gai Mayor Cheryl Szatow** recently to join an initiative to provide **Welcome Packs** for incoming Refugees to NSW.

The Mayor commented: "It is anticipated that NSW will be receiving around 6,000 refugees who will be settled initially in areas with existing community supports and services. Ku-ringgai Council would like to extend a welcoming gesture that aids parents and children to start rebuilding their lives. As a community, Ku-ring-gai has a tradition of compassionate care towards those less fortunate, and I feel sure that we can come together to support those refugees who will need our assistance in making Australia their new home"

The Ku-ring-gai Council, in partnership with the Wahroonga Rotary Club, Lifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury, KYDS Youth Development Service and the Community Migrant Resource Centre (CMRC) will coordinate a community effort to assemble and distribute **Welcome Packs** to incoming families. It is anticipated that the majority of refugees arriving will be women with young families and unaccompanied minors. The **Welcome Packs** will include priority items such as children's toys, games and books, soaps and shampoo, school items and nappies in various sizes.
