A TEDx event is a local gathering where short live talks and videos recorded at previous TED ('Technology, Entertainment and Design') conferences are shared with the community. TEDx events are planned and coordinated on a community-by-community basis. The content and design of each TEDx event is unique and developed independently, but all of them have features in common.

The format is a suite of short, carefully prepared talks, demonstrations and performances that are idea-focused, and cover a wide range of subjects to foster learning, inspiration and wonder - and provoke conversations that matter.

Every TEDx event either shows only TED Talk videos to its audience, or shows both TED Talk videos and live speakers from the community.

All TEDx events present multiple issues and a diversity of voices from many disciplines. After all, what's the fun without a little variety?

A TEDx event is organized by volunteers from the local community, and it lacks any commercial, religious or political agenda. Its goal is to spark conversation, connection and community.

Edwina Throsby is the 'curator' of TEDx Sydney, charged with assembling the range of presenters required. It's a demanding role and she will tell us how she manages to pull together such a fascinating event.

# Last week: Mayor Cheryl Szatow: Council amalgamation



Mayor Cheryl Szatow gave a detailed account of Ku-ring-gai Council's reasons for opposing the state government's proposal to merge Ku-ring-gai and Hornsby Councils. The following summary comes from the Ku-ring-gai Council website.

The financial advantages or disadvantages of the proposal to the residents and ratepayers of the areas concerned

- Ku-ring-gai Council is financially sound. Over the last 10 financial years Council achieved operating surpluses every year.
- The NSW Government's Treasury Corporation (TCorp) rated Ku-ring-gai as being in the top 16 financially strongest out of 152 NSW councils.
- The Net Operating Result for 2014/2015 was a surplus of \$22.5 million after allowing for depreciation on assets.
- IPART has confirmed that Ku-ring-gai Council meets seven Fit for the Future benchmarks by 2016/17.
- Should a merger proceed current council rates will not be affected for the next 4 years. However from Year 5, assuming land values in Ku-ring-gai remain higher than in Hornsby, property rates in the former area of Ku-ring-gai would increase while rates in the former Hornsby area would decrease.
- Previous analysis submitted to IPART showed rate increases by between 5% and 17% in a merged council or \$67 and \$220 pa on average.
- A merger would expose Ku-ring-gai Council to the financial risks of a \$50 million project to make Hornsby Shire Council's quarry safe and useable for recreation.
- Forecast savings from the proposed merger of \$70 million over 20 years is small in comparison to the overall budget of the councils, representing less than 1.5% in savings.
- The merger proposal includes transferring part of the Epping Town Centre to Parramatta Council. This could be detrimental to the financial sustainability of the merged council with the loss of 20,000 residents.

#### The community of interest and geographic cohesion in the existing areas and in any proposed new area

 The two areas are very different, with Ku-ring-gai being urban while Hornsby has significant rural land and includes extensive remote communities and river set-



tlements.

• Ku-ring-gai Council covers approximately 85km2. In contrast Hornsby Shire Council is approximately 455km2 (over 5 times the size of Ku-ring-gai).

• Both Ku-ringgai and Hornsby Councils already have large populations. Ku--gai has a current population of 120.978 and

of 120,978 and projected popu-

lation of 157,040 by 2031. Hornsby has a population of 149,082 and projected population of 193,810 by 2031. (without Epping)

• The merger proposal will create a Council with a 540km2 area and population of 270,060 with projected population of over 350,000 by 2031.

# The existing historical and traditional values in the existing areas and the impact of change on them

- For over 100 years Ku-ring-gai values have been heritage, urban planning and protecting the environment. Under a merged entity these values may be lost or eroded.
- Council has substantially progressed major projects for revitalising Lindfield and Turramurra Local Centres underpinned by strong community support. There is no guarantee these projects would continue in a merged council.

# The attitude of the residents and ratepayers of the areas concerned

- Nine months community consultation has shown:
  - 79% indicated a preference to stand alone
  - 21% preferred to merge with Hornsby Council
- This is the result of an independent survey conducted between April and May 2015.

#### The requirements of the area concerned in relation to elected representation for residents and ratepayers at the local level, the desirable and appropriate relationship between elected representatives and ratepayers and residents and such other matters as considered relevant in relation to the past and future patterns of elected representation for that area

- Councillor representation for the Ku-ring-gai community would significantly reduce in a merged council proposal.
- A merger would result in less say for Ku-ring-gai residents in decisions about how money is spent and in planning future development.

#### The impact of the proposal on the ability of the council to provide adequate, equitable and appropriate services and facilities

- Ku-ring-gai is relatively compact for the delivery of efficient services and access to community facilities. Hornsby Shire is characterised by very large distances, dispersed population settlements and a broad mix of land uses, all of which affect the relative availability of services, facilities and the cost of delivering those services.
- Ku-ring-gai Council has higher revenue per capita than Hornsby Shire, with greater capacity to provide services. A merger would equalise services, resulting in either a reduction of services or increased rates.

# The impact of the proposal on the employment of the staff by the council

- Substantial disruption to services and productivity during the transition period;
- The Fit for the Future program would provide \$10 million for transition costs if Ku-ring-gai and Hornsby merged. However research in Queensland suggests this will not cover the transition costs.

# The need to ensure that the opinions of each of the diverse communities of the resulting area or areas are effectively represented

• Ku-ring-gai Council has undertaken a rigorous process of communication and community consultation regarding the merger proposal. This included an independently conducted and statistically valid survey. Hornsby Council has not consulted its community on this issue since a survey was conducted in 2013.


#### Other factors relevant to the provision of efficient and effective local government in the existing and proposed new areas

- Ku-ring-gai Council delivers best practice environmental management. Examples include its climate change adaptation strategy, community engagement programs, aboriginal heritage management program and natural areas strategic planning.
- Under a merged Council, Ku-ring-gai's Environmental Levy will cease and cannot be renewed.
- The Levy funds the annual delivery of over \$2 million of environmental initiatives. Its cessation would result in a significant reduction in environmental management services, resulting in poorer environmental outcomes.
- This will not necessarily be counteracted by increased spending from any savings/efficiencies in a merged council.


