## ROTARY NEW ZEALAND - EARTHQUAKE APPEAL



**New Zealand** was hit by a 7.5 magnitude earthquake at 12.02 am on 14 November 2016. Fortunately major damage to communities was limited in the main to the South Island town of Kaikoura and surrounding districts.

Kaikoura, a coastal tourist town is situated 180 kms north of Christchurch and has a population of approx. 2000.

Following inquiries from within New Zealand and overseas an Appeal has been set up

## **Chris Curtis Lane Cove Rotary 2010.**

There is so much <u>need</u> in the world it is often difficult to know where to begin.

That was the problem facing my club, Lane Cove Rotary 2010.

We had had been to such places as New Guinea and Nepal to do hands-on work under the old FAIM scheme (remember that?), <u>but</u> many people in need had been building things for centuries, what they lack are the resources to progress in other ways.

In 2010, I joined an <u>NTA monitoring tour</u> (more about the NTA later), to <u>Eastern Indonesia</u> and was very impressed with how things were done.



The concept of <u>small manageable projects</u>, <u>good documentation and supervision</u>, <u>training</u>, <u>a review and reporting system</u>, it was all there, it just needed to be put into a Rotary project context. I suggested a <u>concept</u> to my club and the rest is history, as they say.

So where exactly is the project located?

You may have an idea where Darwin lies on the map and may even have been to Bali at some time. If so, then you could have flown over parts of Nusa Tenggara Timor (NTT).

<u>Flores Sumba and West Timor</u> are the main islands and there are many smaller ones. It is part of the string of islands stretching east from Bali. Kupang, the capital in West Timor is about <u>840km from Darwin</u>. On older English maps, the group is known as <u>The Lesser Sunda Islands</u>.

On the slide are some facts about the province and its people **Population. 6 million** people, about 90% Christian.

Annual income is about 1/3 of the Indonesian average.

Child malnutrition, growth problems and mortality are high because of lack of clean drinking water, sanitation and health facilities, and less than 40% children attend school. 80 children a year are reported to die of malaria.

Farming families on these islands survive at subsistence level in most cases. Cash producing crops are: Cocoa, coconuts, cashews, pigs, some cattle and rice, seaweed.

Water problems exist because of irregular rainfall and the lengthy dry sea-

son. Sinking wells is often useless because of the local geology, which is often derived from uplifted coral reefs. Where wells are possible on the island fringes, they often use the same water strata as the septic toilet systems causing health problems.

[Graphic 3. Group at Kupang] Chris Curtis, Moira De Voss, Mary Bryant, Val Samuelson This slide shows is a small group of Rotarians from different clubs in NSW, at Kupang airport. We toured the project in 2015. This option is open to anyone with an interest, as I will explain a little later.

Kupang in West Timor, by the way, has a long history with Australia. It is where Captain Bligh landed in 1789 after been set adrift from the Bounty. After 6 weeks in an open boat with

16 of his crew, he landed in Kupang which was then a Dutch colony. It was a brilliant display of seamanship not yet discovered by Hollywood. As you know Bligh went on to become the 4th Governor of colonial Australia.

Kupang is also the place where Australian Sparrow force commandos landed in WWII to try to push the Japanese off the island. There is monument to them not far from the town.

In essence, our Small Grants Project raises money and funds specific small projects on farms and in schools in Eastern Indonesia.

Grants are generally about \$500 or less, and cover these types of projects;

Farms Schools

•Water tanks •Library construction.

•Wells
•Furniture
•Ablution blocks
•Fences

•Farm training •Librarian training

Agricultural advise

The people of the region are generally industrious and ready to accept new ideas. They have a traditional self-help system of cooperatives called kelompoks. These are groups of farmers or school groups similar to our P&C. This helps us a lot, as we want a project that is sympathetic to the culture and traditions of the people.

The Small Grants are made to these <u>groups</u>, rather than to individuals. When a Small Project is accepted for support, materials and project advice is provided, but the work is carried out by the Kelompok. This ensures that

"ownership" of the project remains with the people and long term maintenance is ensured.

Most kelompoks don't have signs but this one tells us something about what they do. It is called Kelompok Cattle Farming Otan 1.

You can see that they have a membership of 21 and that they are involved in, cattle, fishing, seaweed, vegetables and forestry.

Interesting to note that the seaweed was introduced under the scheme I am describing, although not by Rotary at the time.

The needs of the people start with farm productivity and water supply and lead to school equipment and facilities. <u>Farm productivity</u> is important because it is a precursor for so many other things. With a little extra cash, farmers can allow their children to attend school, for example. Improved water supply leads to better sanitation and improved health.

[Graphic 9. School furniture] Better school facilities lead to better school attendance and educational results.

[Graphic 7. Water tank] Water equals hygiene as well as irrigation. Where the land does not provide because of the geology, tanks can fill the gap.

These toilets might seem crude to us but are actually clean and efficient. [Graphic 9. Grass school library and furniture]

So much for the small projects on farms and schools, let's go to our Rotary project.

A Unique Rotary Project!

As Rotary projects go, this one is probably unique, in that each year a new group of small projects to fund is selected. So that the encompassing "Rotary Project" is renewed, each year from a new mix of numerous small farm or school projects.

Last year we funded over 40 small projects in farms and schools to a value of \$12,000, for example.

#### The NTA

Remember earlier that I mentioned the Nusa Tenggara Association, the NTA?

The NTA in an Australian Non Government Organisation, (an NGO) based in Canberra. It has worked in Eastern Indonesia since 1988. It is a fully accredited aid agency, mostly staffed by volunteers and partly funded by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT). Further background information can be found on their website.

<u>The NTA are our small grants facilitators</u>. They do the organising, the training, sourcing of advisors, like agricultural field officers from the Indonesian Agricultural Department, and librarian training experts.

The NTA conducts a four-week project monitoring tour to Indonesia twice each year, usually in November and June. In each four-week period, more than 150 kelompoks, including about 50 schools, are visited and the members interviewed. Each kelompok will have one or more small projects in progress. And most importantly to us - produce a detailed report on each small project, its cost and successful completion. In addition, in each four-week monitoring period, they also hold two training seminars to help the kelompoks to plan and manage projects and to make submissions for grants.

The Rotary Small Grants Project is set up to engage with the NTA. Our management committee selects from the NTA small projects list and offers to support specific projects up to a value that we nominate. Because of the NTA monitoring system timetable, we usually operate from April to April each year.

(By the way, they welcome other individuals and groups to join them on these trips. It is how I became involved.)

[Graphic 13. Kelompok meeting]

This slide shows a typical review meeting. One of the 150 or more conducted in the 4-week tour. In each kelompok the format is similar;

Review the history of past and current grant projects. • Discuss and consider new grants.

Inspect the results of the grants already completed and,

In the case of farms, to advise the farmers on better farming methods and arrange for training where necessary.

In the case of schools, to discuss school needs like furniture, fencing to restrict wandering animals, libraries and librarian training.

All of these training opportunities are set up by NTA,
