- I. As our constitution, we have adopted the standard club constitution prescribed by Rotary International. This club understands that the club constitution can be amended only by convention of Rotary International, or (under certain circumstances for exceptional reasons) by the board of directors af Ratary International, in accordance with Section 3, Article I, of the by-laws of R.I. No amendment to the by-laws adopted by this club which might conflict with the constitution of the club or with the constitution and by-laws af Rotary International will be made without first submitting such proposed amendment to the secretary of Rotary International for approval by its board of directors.
- This club will be bound by any and all amendments to the standard club constitution which may be adopted hereafter (as provided in Article I, Section 3, of the by-laws of Rotary International, and in Article XIII of the constitution of this club).
- 3. This club will remit payment for its members' subscriptions to THE ROTARIAN as provided for in the club by-laws upon receipt of invoice covering such subscriptions. (An obligation of membership in the United States and Conada; elsewhere anly when Article X is retained in club canstitution.)
- 4. NO FURTHER MEMBERS will be elected between the filing of this application and the receipt of the afficial natice of the admission of the club to membership in Ratary International. Thereafter this club will faithfully endeavor to add to its membership at least one and not mare than three new members each month during the first year of its existence.

- This club, as a club, will not become a member of, or assume obligations of membership in any organization other than Rotary International.
- 6. This club is hereby pledged, in its desire to develop true Rotarians and a Rotary club that will function properly as a unit in Rotary International, to maintain the following fundamental characteristics of Rotary:
 - a. The classification principle of membership.
 - Attendance, at least in the required minimum, for continuance of membership.
 - c. Fellowship, in the establishment of Intimate and lasting friendships.
 - d. The use of the club meeting in the making of broader and better business men — in training men to become more capable of rendering service in their vocations and in the community in which they live.
 - e. The requirement that members strive for the betterment of their craft, particularly stressing higher business standards and practices.
 - f. An obligation to do effective but non-duplicative service in their community, state or province, and country.
 - g. Service to mankind,
 - The advancement of international understanding, good will and peace.



THE EMBLEM OF ROTARY

The Rotary Emblem, firstly conceived and adopted in 1905, was the representation of a wagon wheel. As other clubs were organised this was modified to some extent, and in some cases a geared or cogged Wheel was used. In 1912 an Emblem embodying a geared Wheel was adopted, it comprises of six spokes, 24 cogs and keyway; colours are Royal Blue and Gold, with the words "Rotary International" inscribed.

"Rotary" does not make a Rotarian. The member, in the first place, must believe in the principles of Rotary, not after he has been approved for membership, but long before he has been accorded the privilege of becoming a member.

Different designs were peculiar to tribes, localities and types of messages. The markings or symbols could only be understood between the sender and the receiver. The name Ku-ring-gai came from the tribe of the Ku-ring-gai who inhabited the coastal district—it was the aboriginal word for "the men" applied by that tribe to themselves.

HISTORICAL



In most of the cities and towns of the world the nearby hill districts prove the most attractive areas as places in which to live, and this is the situation of Ku-ring-gai to the rest of Sydney.

One of the largest municipalities in the Sydney District, it lies between Roseville. Wahroonga and Bobbin Head, and between the Lane Cove River and Middle Harbour, with 60,000 residents.

Looking at the Municipality to-day, with its pleasant homes and tree-lined streets, it takes something of an effort to cast one's mind back 170 years to the day in April, 1788, when Governor Phillip passed through on his exploratory trip overland from Manly Cove, only a short time after the arrival of the First Fleet.

The impression made on members of the party by the virgin and gullies was recorded by Phillip's Surgeon General in his diary. With a confiner camping place in the vicinity of the Bungaroo swimming hole at St. Ives, he noted that "here in the most desolate, wild and solitary seclusion that the imagination can form any idea of, we took up our abode for the night."

Doubtless there were other explorations, but after Phillip's visit nothing seems to have happened for about 20 years when one William Henry, who came to Australia as a Private in the Royal Marines, took possession of land near Blue Gum Creek, which runs into the Lane Cove River, in 1807.

He lived there on his proparty "Milwood Farm," until about 1850, but apparently was never successful in establishing a title to the land, although it seems that he was promised an extensive grant by Governor Bligh.

The first recorded land grant for the district was one of 400 acres at Roseville to Daniel Matthew in 1819. Joseph Fidden, who arrived in Australia as a prisoner and after whom Fiddens Wharf Road, Killara, is known, was also given a grant in 1821.

Robert Pymble, after whom the railway station and district are named, distinguished himself by capturing a bushranger, and for a reward received 600 acres in 1823

There were other large grants but those mentioned were to the early arrivals.

For the first stage in the development of Ku-ring-gai there came the timber-getters, attracted by the dense growth of big trees on the ridges and in the gullies. One tree at Wahroonga was 33 feet in girth, and stout timbers taken from the heights still exist in many city buildings.

The timber-getters lived a hard ife and apparently played hard too, for their reputation was not the best. An issue of the "Sydney Gazette" in February, 1841, carried an editorial to the effect that "the district has long been noted as a resort of disreputable people, and we do not hesitate to say that there should be a military post established there to prevent smuggling and sly grog selling. If an active Police Magistrate were to visit this infamous district frequently, we make no doubt that much would be done towards cleansing it of as great a set of ruffians as the colony holds."

There were frequent flights, both impromptu and organised, and one at Pearce's Corner in 1869 for the Championship of Australia was fought until nightfall, but was not resumed next day because one of the contestants decided he had better things to do.

The orchardists carried on for more than half a century and fruit and crops were bountiful, but taking a living from the land became gradually more difficult owing to poor methods of cultivation, destruction by bush fires and the inroads of pests and diseases. Many of the orchards were abandoned.

In making their way into the district the pioneers had to push through the thick scrub and tall trees. Naturally the high central ridge offered the easiest route and so the location of the main road and the railway was fixed. However, as late as even 1850 there was no cleared road and settlements were few and far between.

sides which branched out from the main ridge were made with Sydney's first automatic road making equipment—bullock drays. The main road itself had an evil reputation, and those who travelled along it by the horse drawn bus, established in the 1860's, often had to get out and push. It was not until the turn of the century that travellers could move on it with any confidence of reaching their destination.

It was probably the weariness of residents from riding horses which led to a petition being made in 1874 for a railway to be built. The plan was for it to run from what is now Pearce's Corner to the harbour. There seems to have been much Government and private opposition, but finally a railway from Hornsby to the present St. Leonards station was completed in 1889 being extended to Milson's Point in 1893.

The coming of the raiway provided the needed spur for the organisation of Ku-ring-gai and large areas of land near railway stations were cut up into home sites. Ku-ring-gai has not looked back since.

During all this time there was no Counci to govern the area, and work on the main road and side streets was done by the State Public Works Department. Various Progress Associations were formed in an effort to improve the district and one was so well organised that its members paid voluntary taxes for road maintenance, street tree planting and gas lighting.

The desire to have a Council for the district, coupled with similar demands from other areas in the State, led to a Royal Commission being appointed in 1905 to recommend the formation of many shires.

Ku-ring-gai was proclaimed a Shire in 1906, but only after a fierce controversy had been settled as to whether the Parish of Gordon was to be divided into two Shires, the internal boundary being Ryde and Pittwater Roads, or to be one area.

The name "Ku-ring-gai" had been taken from the name given to Ku-ring-gai Chase in 1894 by the Hon. Henry Copeland, then Minister for Lands. The word was taken from the aboriginal work for "The Men", used by aboriginals living in the coastal districts between the Macleay River and Bulli.

By 1928 the district had grown so rapidly that the nine Councillors of the Shire found it difficult to cope with the business brought to them and in that year the Shire became a Municipaity with twleve Aldermen. The present Council Chambers was also built.

The Municipality now stands at the middle stage of development and, although it was once estimated that the ultimate population of 100,000 would be reased about the vear 2000 present trends indicate that this

ROTARY'S UNIVERSAL PROJECT.

The one project in which all Rotary Clubs around the world are participating, is the Rotary Foundation Fellowship's Programme, which was inaugurated as a Memorial to the Founder of Rotary, Paul P. Harris.

These Fellowships enable outstanding graduate students to live and study for one year in a country other than their own, as ambassadors of goodwill, on grants averaging \$2,500.

Since 1947 1,200 students from 67 countries have enjoyed such privilege at a cost of \$3,000,000. Total grants now approach \$5,600,000. This District has contributed up to June, 1958, \$349,393.

All but the newer Clubs are at least 100 per cent subscribers, whilst 11 stand at 200 per cent, with 3 at 300 per cent.
