



Key achievements in Uganda We have been working hard in the field in Uganda and have achieved to date:

- Sourced and purchased 10 acres of land;
- Worked with Ugandan Solicitors to register us as a Ugandan NGO;
- Solicited the help and compliance of the Ministry of Education;
- Met various government officials and local representatives to ensure we will be accepted into the community;
- Employed over 20 Ugandans including an engineer, operations manager, security and builders;
- Consulted local people for advice and support, including choosing the name and motto for the school.
- Employed 5 teachers Janepher and Aida, with 18 years' teaching experience between them

<u>Community meeting to name the school</u> Katuso Primary and Vocational School Motto: ' *Nezikokolima*'

Why Muduuma? According to the District Development Report 2010: Pupil teacher ratio is 50:1 Pupil classroom ratio is 65:1 Pupil desk ratio is 6:1 Average distance to primary schools is 4km Unemployment rate is 66.9%, the majority of whom are women.

- Only 2% of women are employed. Women are mostly involved in house work, crop farming, poultry on a subsistence level and brick making
- Youth form 60% of the total population, 40% of whom are unemployed and lack vocational and business

Rotary Foundation Thoughts

8) This week's Rotary Foundation Thought is about how a Matching Grant can make a difference.

From 2008 to 2010 the Rotary club of Beecroft and Espirito Santo Vanuatu implemented a water supply project in Mota Lava Vanuatu, that linked 5 villages with 5 kms of water pipe to supply clean drinking water to 1700 villagers. A plus from the program was that the villagers learned skills to enable them to connect the 5th village to the system.

Beecroft contributed \$5000 and Santo just \$100 but with \$5,000 from D6940 USA and \$200 from D9680 a Rotary Foundation match of \$7,750 was gained for a total funding of about AUD\$23,000. The Matching Grant allows Clubs to combine with Clubs all over the world to obtain funds that will be matched by The Rotary Foundation to falcate life changing projects.

Please check with the D9680 Grants Chair to learn about the eligibility guidelines and the best way of dealing with the 100 Future Vision Plan Districts as there are some complications when FVP and non FVP Districts try to engage. But only until 2013-14.

This is just one of the many examples of how the Foundation's humanitarian grants programs can make positive changes by reducing disease risk by providing fresh clean water.
