Guest Speaker Next Week

Tom Sweeney

Tom has been with Macquarie Park Cemetery and Crematorium for over 4 years now and during that time has come to understand the pressure that a bereavement places on families and how Macquarie Park can help.

As a Funeral Celebrant, Tom understands the funeral industry and welcomes the opportunity to help people negotiate the process after a loved one passes away.

Prior to joining Macquarie Park, Tom was Community Relations Manager for the North Shore Heart Research Foundation, Community Relations for the Royal Institute for Deaf and Blind Children and Public Relations Manager for Hornsby Hospital. These positions cover a span of over 30 years.

Tom will cover some of the interesting history and the people that are part of what was the Northern Suburbs Cemetery- now Macquarie Park. More importantly he will answer all those questions you have been 'dying' to ask.

His talk is called "The Plot Thickens" - no pun intended. Tom is married to Joy and is President of Willoughby Theatre Company, Past President of the Rotary Club of Crows Nest and resides at Killara.

Guest Speaker Diana Hanks

Diana is President of Gosford City Rotary, now 4 years old and they have 35 members.

Last year Diana a retired principal in the Central Coast and she understood the issues with Aboriginal Learning.

She looked at the enrolment figures and results and obtained a percentage of the number of Aboriginal children; She approached the local principals and asked if they were given a Dilly bag would they use it.

A Dilly bag has 55 books and they focus on children age 3 to 6.

Tales from a Dilly Bag literacy project assists young Indigenous children and their classmates to develop Emergent Literacy skills and understandings.

Introducing and exploring the Dilly Bag

Mentors are given the opportunity to explore and browse the collection of books. They are then asked questions such as

"When you were little what book did you love the most and why?"

"Can you find a book that was your favourite?"

"Select your favourite book and share with the group why the book means something to you?"

- The mentors, whilst firmly hanging onto their favourite book, are allowed to further explore the kit on their own
- They explore all components of the kit including the provided activities and art materials.

Why picture books?

This can be a brainstorming activity to explore why picture books are so fantastic for kids. TOP 13 reasons:-

Book Selection and introducing the Shoe Box .

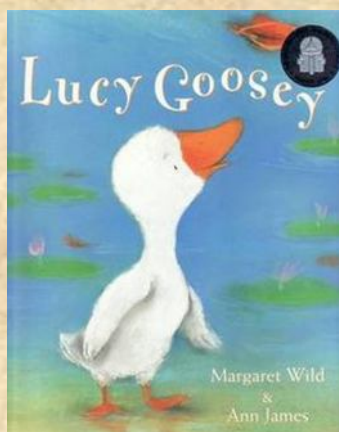
- Mentors organise themselves into groups of three as this allows them to work one on one with kindergarten students in each group.
 - Each group then shares their previously selected "Favourite Book" to decide which book the group would share with the kindergarten students.
- During this process the mentors are given a list of tasks to discuss and complete...
- 1.What is the story about?
 - 2.Whose perspective is the book written from?
 - 3.Who are the main characters?
 - 4.What is the theme of the book?
 - 5.What message is the author trying to deliver?
 - 6.How effective are the illustrations in telling the story? And does the text match the illustrations?
 - 7.How is the text written? Rhyming, bold/italic text, repetitive phrases?

The Shoe Box

After books are selected and investigated for the quality and effectiveness of the stories, mentors decide what features of the book would appeal to the younger students. This may include...

- Theme
- Characters
- Words

The mentors are then invited to select what props they could use to enhance the books appeal and help younger children recall what the story was about. They make a list of the items they could bring from home or make to bring their book alive and make the experience for the kinders more hands on. The mentors bring a shoe box to school that they can use to store items, include activities and materials to use when sharing the book.
