Funding for the bus was covered by \$1025 from New Generations budget, \$975 from the Christmas party and \$2000 from a Rotary Foundation District Simplified Grant. Eagles RAPS is very excited and grateful for the bus because it will enable them to take young people on educational excursions which are not possible at present. This is a win for everyone!

Some of you may not know that Eagles RAPS is located in Doonside and is

dedicated to the prevention of youth suicide by giving opportunities to

young people from disadvantaged/dysfunctional back-grounds through education and the building of self-confidence. The organisation has established a "school" providing an education for young people unable to attend mainstream schools for varying reasons. This "school" was established in 2003 with 2 students and currently has 183. The students' success rate is 83% in

various TAFE courses, the majority being the completion of Year 10. Eagles

RAPS is working to break the cycle of unemployment and welfare dependency.

We have helped them in the past with the provision of computers through

Tony's son,, other donations in kind and a large donation

from the profit of an early Garden Festival. Hopefully we will be able to

Ivan Cribb Guest Speaker

When aged four Ivan contracted an eye infection. He was admitted to the Children's Hospital where he underwent about six operations. At the conclusion of these he could no longer see. He was subsequently taken to another ophthalmologist who was highly critical of what had been done but by then it was too late.

He first attended the school conducted by (the now Royal) NSW Institute for Deaf and Blind children. Most of the pupils (including those living in Sydney) were boarders from Monday to Friday. His Mum, however, would not allow him to become a boarder. Ivan does not think he would have survived that experience. His family lived in Carlton and the school was situated in City Road, Darlington. His Mum took him to school every morning, returned home and then returned to collect him in the afternoon. Occasionally his Dad was able to help out. Ivan learned Braille and to read and greatly enjoy books at the blind school but it offered only a low grade primary education. It was envisaged that most of the pupils would, after leaving school, work in a sheltered workshop making cane chairs, mats and the like or make their way as musicians of some kind. His Mum wanted much more than that for her son. She obtained an interview with a senior education official as a result of which she obtained permission for Ivan to attend the Public School system. In the mean time Ivan had been learning typing at a local convent. At the age of about twelve he attended the sixth class at Carlton South Public School from where he went on to Canterbury Boys' High.

Apart from a few Braille titles in the English course, such as Shakespeare, there were no text books in Braille nor facilities to produce them, no tape recorders, let alone computers. His parents, mostly his Dad, read the ordinary text books to him and Ivan made notes in Braille. It was on these that he based his studies. He was good at English, History and languages but poor at Maths. After receiving the Leaving Certificate he received a scholarship to Sydney University where he studied Arts and Law. He still used the same method to study as at school, having books read and taking notes in Braille. He was still relying on friends and family to travel to and from the University as he was still unable to travel alone. Of social life he had virtually none. He graduated with degrees in Arts and Law, the latter with Honours.

Following graduation Ivan experienced one of the worst periods of his life. Unable to find a permanent job he went to the Bar but, without connections, the financial returns were meagre in the extreme. He still sometimes dreams that he has no job. It is a great relief to awake and find he no longer needs one. However, there was one really bright spot when he acquired a Guide Dog. This gave him the ability to go out independently and opened up a completely new world. He even gained the confidence to go out with girls!

Ivan's real break came when, through friends, he was offered a position with the legal firm, . Dawson Waldron Edwards and Nicholls (now Ashurst Australia). It was in

a section of the firm concerned with work for the City Sydney Council. When Ivan joined it was a moderately sized firm (not the colossus of to-day) and he was lucky to be placed in the area of Local Government and Environmental Law which, although a specialty, but with a range far more diverse than much commercial law. Initially Ivan continued to work in much the same way as at school and University except that he now had his secretary read incoming correspondence, Acts and text books. He continued to make notes in Braille but a taperecorder soon greatly facilitated the work. After due consideration he then dictated his letters, advisings, etc. In 1963 he became the senior solicitor in the section with several junior solicitors working under his supervision. In 1971 he was appointed a Senior Associate giving him the right to sign his own mail and those working under his supervision. He had effective authority to run the section subject only to consulting the relevant partner when he deemed it necessary. Towards the end of his career he acquired a small computer, which would be considered a mere toy these days but which was very helpful in allowing him to download much legal (and other) material courtesy of a print scanner in the State Library without burdening his secretary.

The strides which technology has taken are breathtaking but he has been able to take advantage of may of them in his private life.

In 1967, after meeting through friends, Joyce and Ivan were married. Their family now consists of three adult children (two daughters and a son) and their partners and six young grand children. Joyce has been an indispensable partner for Ivan ever since.

In the mid-sixties Ivan was invited to join the Committee of the NSW Guide Dog Association. He remained with the Association for about thirty years, holding various positions in the state and what was then, the National Association. He served on the national Council and various sub-committees for many years, including four terms as National President, a position which no longer exists. Subsequently he was also invited to join the Council of the Royal Blind Society NSW (now part of Vision Australia). He was a member of the Council for approximately twenty-five years serving four terms as Vice-President. In recognition of his voluntary work for vision impaired people he was awarded Membership in the Order of Australia (AM)in 1994. He has been a member of this club (for the second time) since 1994, held several Board positions and served as President 1999-2000. Given the alternatives of living at home on the disability pension or working in a sheltered workshop, Ivan believes he has had no alternative but to try to live as normal a life as possible. Very many people have helped him in this task but he singles out four women, in particular, his mother, the two ladies who, at different times. worked as his secretary and thereby undertook much more difficult work than would normally have been the case, and Joyce. With their help and others, he has been able to have an interesting and responsible career, raise a lovely family and make a not insifnificant contributionto the community
