Solar Power for Katuuso School

Last week Past President Greg Newling reported completion and commissioning of the solar power plant for Katuuso Primary and Vocational School in Uganda, set up by School for Life Foundation Australia.



Key benefits provided by the new plant are:

- Increased efficiency of operations, as computers, phones and printers can now be located at the school.
- Increased hours

of operation, due to night time lighting.

- Improved water quality due to electronic filtration.
- Improved nutrition of the school's feeding program due to refrigeration.
- Increased security of the school through lighting.

Our club and other Rotary clubs contributed funds to-



wards the project, which was fully funded with the help of a 'matching grant' from the Rotary Foundation.

Adele Mitchell Viewing Mountain Gorillas in Rwanda

Adele gave us another of her fascinating travelogues, introducing us to

Rwanda, a country of 11 million people in an area of only 26,000 square kilometres. Known as the land of 1,000 hills (and many lakes) it comprises mostly subsis-

tence farmers, as well as many tea plantations. Adele commented on how happy the people are, despite the appalling genocide only 20 years ago. It seems that the majority Hutu and minority Tutsi tribes have learned to live in harmony with each other.



The mountain gorillas that Adele went to view live in the Virunga Range in the north of Rwanda. They are guarded 24 hours a day, but the greatest danger they face are traps set by deer poachers. 1,000 traps are removed each year.

Adele visited 2 gorilla families, each led by a 200Kg 1.8m silverback - a vegetarian who can eat 100kg of wild celery, stinging nettles, thistles, blackwattle and bamboo shoots each day.

The gorillas are unafraid of humans and Adele was delighted at how close she was able to come to them.



Also in the Virunga Range, Adele trekked to see golden monkeys (an even more endangered species which lives in family groups of up to 60) and chimpanzees.

Before leaving Rwanda, Adele visited an orphanage housing hundreds of children, and handed over a donation of clothes.

What is 'Koongga'?

The emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai is the "Koongga", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aboriginals. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a "Koongga" is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the "Koongga" is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters.

The colours and symbols on a "Koongga" vary with each tribe. The ones chosen by the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, our banner bids to all who receive it, a friendly "Karltandi", a friendly welcome.
