The first District 9685 Confer-



# Rotary Youth Leadership Award Call For Nominees



aged 18 - 25 years

RYLA is a one-week leadership training program for young adults 18-26. Next year it will be held at Vision Valley, Arcadia from Sunday 12 to Saturday 18 January 2014.

RYLA commenced in Queensland in 1959 and has spread throughout the Rotary world.

It started in our District in 1970. Many young people who have attended RYLA have described it as a life-changing experience. It has benefited them as leaders in their local community, volunteer activities and in their careers and business dealings. It is a powerful and valuable program.

Our District 9685 is looking for 85 participants and our club will be sponsoring one. The cost of each sponsorship is \$815, which includes 6 days accommodation, meals, presentations, workshops and activities in behavioural analysis, negotiation and conflict resolution, public speaking, self-motivation and goal setting, group dynamics and team building and community service.

We are looking for applicants! Would you like to nominate someone who meets the following criteria?

- Between the ages of 18 and under 27 at 1.1.2014, and has left school for at least one year.
- Currently involved, or anticipates being involved, in some form of local community youth leadership – in groups such as scouting, guiding, sporting clubs, church groups, government agencies, local business and emergency services.

To date we have not received any nominations, so your Youth Committee needs help from club members and others to nominate potential RYLA participants. We need to receive nominations and conduct interviews this month!

# Last Week's Speaker



Sara Mehrabi
Coal Seam Gas Mining
And Its
Expected Impacts

President Tony's daughter-in-law, Sara Mehrabi, a groundwater engineer with over 10 years industry and research experience, gave a fascinating talk, focusing on the basic facts on coal seam gas (CSG) mining in NSW.

CSG is methane, which is non-toxic and occurs naturally in the air we breathe. Underground, it is trapped in cracks in coal and kept in place by water pressure. 'Fracking' (hydraulic fracturing by injection of high pressure water) is only required when a coal seam does not have enough interconnected cracks. The 'footprint' of CSG mining is small by comparison with other types of mining.

Fracking does not use toxic chemicals in NSW. The mixture used is 99.5% sand and water. Chemicals are used to lubricate drill heads. NSW has strong regulations to prevent contamination of good quality water aguifers.

Water pumped out of coal seams is very saline (but not as much as sea water). Use or disposal of it is one of the biggest issues facing the industry. Reinjection to the coal seam is the best method of disposal.

Sink holes are not caused by CSG mining because no solid material is removed. Some slight subsidence might be caused. Longwall mining presents a much greater hazard.

CSG mining only occurs at depths at which coal extraction is uneconomic. If the community rejects CSG mining, energy costs will increase. On the other hand, CSG mining will be unnecessary if more effective batteries are developed to store electricity generated by solar or wind power.
