
Let's have a good turn out of our members to hear the latest news from our new District. It's business as usual, fellows!

Annabelle Chauncy Update on Katuuso School



Annabelle grew up in the Southern Highlands of NSW. Having completed her undergraduate Arts/Law degree, in 2007 she spent 3 months in Kenya and Uganda, where she undertook aid work as part of the World Youth International Overseas Service Project.

Having fallen in love with the people and the continent, she returned to Australia dedicated and motivated to create realistic change in Africa. She returned numerous times and in November 2008 to March 2009 she led a volunteer school building project in Northern Uganda with Australian organisation *Hands of Help*.

School for Life Foundation's man on the ground, Dave Everett, graduated from a degree in Development Studies at Macquarie University in 2009.

Born in South Africa, Dave lived in Botswana until he was two years old before moving to Sydney. In 2007 Dave's four-month trip to Kenya turned into almost a year, where he was involved in sustainable community projects, such as the distribution of mosquito nets, installation of an irrigation system, establishment of bore hole and cattle trough, and numerous other income generating ventures.

Building the school combines Dave's love for the outdoors, kids and his passion for helping impoverished communities. Dave currently lives full-time in Uganda as the Country Director, where he oversees the day-to-day management of employees, building and maintenance of the school.

School for Life is focused on "breaking the cycle" of poverty through education and the construction of a combined primary school and vocational training centre called 'Katuuso' in rural Uganda.

School for Life strongly believes that education is everything. It is the key to creating lasting change. Education increases literacy and improves employment prospects, which is why the Foundation is ensuring it is accessible for Ugandans in poverty stricken, rural and remote areas.

The Katuuso school has 8 classrooms and separate buildings for administrative and other purposes. The school employs 30 staff, from teachers to cooks, groundsmen and security staff. There is a deep water bore, which provides clean water to the entire local community. The school provides 3 nutritious meals per day for the students, who would otherwise be inadequately fed. (The school charges a nominal fee for attendance, so that local families do not take it for granted.)

Planning is underway to acquire more land, upon which to build a secondary school for 300 students, with boarding facilities.

Alive Medical services visits Katuuso periodically to perform a medical clinic for the whole community. On a recent visit, it provided 5 doctors, 2 nutritionists, counsellors and lab technicians to ensure that accurate tests for HIV, malaria and other illnesses were performed. The students and community received free medications and health care advice. The overall health and nutrition of our students has increased significantly since they began at Katuuso Primary School in January.

Recently the vocational part of the school has been teaching the students and the entire local community better agriculture and farming practices, including skills of sustainability, intercropping and adding value to their land with cash crops like coffee and chilli. It's all part of the Foundation's approach to creating a holistic development within the entire community at Katuuso.

The agriculture plot has now seen its first harvest. Onions, beans, and cabbage have all been picked and the maize has finished growing and is now drying on the stalks. The red chillis are also currently being harvested. Once picked, they are dried on plastic mats for 2-4 days and then stored in sacks. The last 4-6 weeks has seen the chillis become ripe almost as fast as they can be harvested.

The rainy season is fast approaching and Katuuso will be planting 3,000 coffee trees. The subsistence plot will be replanted due to the rainy season beginning and the school will be growing, tomatoes, onions, beans, bananas, matooke, maize and cabbages to feed its students.

The school's animal farm has continued to expand and its goat has recently given birth to 2 kids, one male and one female. The school has purchased more hens to go with its two cockerels, so it is hoping there will be some chicks soon!
