Greg Newling reported that great progress is being made in preparation for the project to build water supply and sewerage systems for villages in Laos. 6 Rotary clubs are involved in NSW, 5 in NSW and 1 in

Thailand, as well as 3 Rotary Districts. The clubs have committed \$34,000 and the Rotary Foundation \$47,000.




team' for its marketing of the event. He said that new promotional leaflets were being produced, Facebook advertising had commenced and all past riders were being contacted by email.

Social enterprises: harnessing the power of business for social change

Ben is the CEO of Social Enterprise Finance Australia (SEFA). His presentation was on the emerging 'social enterprise sector' and how SEFA can assist. David Bennet, a director of SEFA, also attended. David recently retired from Macquarie Bank as their Group Treasurer. Social enterprises target a double or triple bottom line:

Social enterprises target a double or triple bottom line: monetary profit as well as positive social and/or environmental impact. Social enterprise is defined by its positive benefit to society and the environment.

SEFA provides loans to organisations that combine the power, scalability and discipline of business with social impact, with a particular focus on community, indigenous and environmental projects e.g. housing, health &



wellbeing, education, hospitality and retailing. SEFA is one of the Australian government's Social Enterprise Development and Investment Funds (SEDIF). The government provided SEFA \$10m funding and other capital was contributed by private investors.

SEFA is a for profit entity, but where it differentiates itself from the traditional banks is that it will take on **reputational risk**. This means that community-based projects now have a much better chance of obtaining funding where they can also demonstrate they have the appropriate business practices in place to provide confidence in the credit assessment process. SEFA to some extent is a hybrid of not-for-profit and for profit businesses, as it takes on projects that have elements of both groups.

Some of the examples Ben provided included a crisis accommodation provider in Cairns, a community organisation building affordable retirement homes in Tasmania, and a Great Barrier Reef tour operator working with disadvantaged youth. Many of us will also be familiar with the Big Issue

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magazine, which is sold in the Sydney CBD and where half of payment goes to the seller's pocket. All of these projects have sustainable self-funding business models and envisage at some point the loans will be repaid.

One member asked the question "what happens where the business can't repay its loan?". Ben said that, in an extreme case, SEFA would take steps to close the en-

tity if it meant getting its funds repaid. He acknowledged that SEFA would most likely be prepared to provide some extended credit arrangements given its charter, but ultimately it would have to take action like any other lender.
