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

# Sheryl van Nunen Ticks and allergies

Dr Sheryl van Nunen is a clinical immunologist, an Associate Professor at the Sydney University Medical School and a member



Sheryl serves on the committee of Tick-induced Allergies Research and Awareness ('TiARA'), a research fund established at RNSH which aims at making it easier for patients to live with tick-induced allergies, while researching ways to prevent and cure tick induced allergies.

Sheryl will talk about the research she has carried out into tick bites and their consequences, prevention and cure and the work of TiARA. This is a subject of particular relevance to those who live in Ku-ring-gai, who may be at risk from ticks.

## **Bobbin Head Cycle Classic**

Peter Kipps presented a summary of the results of marketing of 'The Bobbo' to date. Highlights included:

- A majority of registered riders rode the event last year.
- Of new riders, 40% came from the 'Spring' and 'Gong' rides; 29% through Facebook and 10% through advertising in bike shops.
- 75% of registrants have applied for the 104km ride,
   11% for the 80km ride and 13% for the 57 km ride.





## Last week's speaker

## Joy Aimée How to write a best seller

Joy Aimée is a freelance writer, coach, editor and publisher who assists others to tell their story,



whether business or personal. She has owned and operated her own business for over a decade. An inspiring coach, mentor and speaker she regards every client's writing 'voice' as unique and precious. She is motivated by a desire to assist others in realizing their creative dream.

Joy started her talk by thanking the club executive, and particularly Michael Tyler and Rob Hall, for the invitation to speak on the topic of "How to Write a Bestseller." Using the poetic license for which she is renowned, she expanded the topic to encompass how publishing has changed in the last ten years since the advent of the internet and eBooks, and how to access more of your innate creativity!

In discussing the frequent misuse of the words 'best seller', Joy pointed out that these days anyone can write a manuscript, turn it into PDF, put it on a website somewhere and describe it as a "world-wide bestseller". This is often the ploy of those wanting to sell online courses or products. These simple eBooks are often badly written and have had little or no editing.

Traditionally, a best seller in Australia translates to sales of more than 5,000 books. With access to global eBook retailers, Australian authors can now access a worldwide market without prohibitive freight costs or the necessity of finding a publisher in every country.

Joy's company, A&A Book Publishing, offers its authors national distribution of hard copy (print) books through its distributor Dennis Jones & Associates. A&A used to distribute its eBooks itself, selling off Amazon, iTunes, Kobo and Sony. However, it has recently done a deal to distribute them through Dennis Jones as well, as they have relationships with many more international eBook sellers, including libraries all over the world, and Australian-based eBook retailers such as JB Hifi and Big W. This means that A&A's authors now have access to an even greater national and international marketplace.

Of course, recent bestseller success stories such as the Harry Potter series, "50 Shades of Grey" or "The Da Vinci Code" capture everyone's imagination. Joy likened being the author of one of those successful books to winning the lottery; for every winner, there are millions of losers. In fact, that ability to tap into the next Big Thing is a combination of timing, luck and accessing your own brilliant ideas.

Accessing brilliant ideas involves getting rid of the "monkey chatter" that clutters up our minds with a million different thoughts and distractions. One of the exercises Joy teaches my clients, and that she presented to the club members, is designed to clear the mind so that productive writing and creative ideas can emerge. Called "The Brain Drain pages", this simple technique

works as follows:

- 1. Use a pen and paper. (A computer won't work, as the letters must be formed manually for the desired result.)
- 2. Write for 5 minutes or 6 pages, whichever comes first.
- 3. Simply write down your thoughts as you have them. Don't judge them, just write them down. If you miss one, let it go and move on to the next.
- 4. When you have finished your 5 minutes or 6 pages, put them away without re-reading. After a month, you can take them out and re-read them. You might be surprised at how many situations you had worried about have resolved. You might also be interested in the ideas that start to come through your writing.
- 5. As a variation, try using your non-dominant hand (for most of us this is the left hand). As the left hand accesses the right side of the brain which is where creativity and intuition reside, you might be surprised over time at the results you achieve. Another variation Joy likes to use is unlined paper, and/or coloured paper. It is less like school and more like fun if you can write unrestricted by lines or white paper. Some authors (Bryce Courtney was one) favour the use of yellow legal pads).
