David Bennett Shaping Suburbia: towards the suburbs of the future



David Bennett is an architect, advocate and educator. He consults to government, developers, property owners and design & delivery teams. He provides expert advice relating to managing city growth with genuine sustainability outcomes. David runs his own Sydneybased architectural and sustainability consulting practice, SIX-D Environments, and the organisation Shaping Suburbia. He is co-chair of the Australian Institute of Architects NSW Sustainability Committee.

As the pressure of population increase on cities is only going to continue, fitting more people into the same space has usually resulted in multi-storey unit blocks being presented as the main solution. For high concentration centres that's sensible and necessary, but what role should the other parts of cities play in this growth?

Shaping Suburbia has focused on what healthy, sustainable living might look like and how existing suburbia can evolve to be that place. Its research connects the types of places/houses we choose to live in with the walk-ability of environments and the benefits that improved walk-ability can bring.

Shaping Suburbia proposes a new development model of urban infill which addresses these sustainability issues and provides lifestyle, heath, economic and real sustainability outcomes.

Pride of Workmanship



Each year our club shows its appreciation of those in our community who strive for excellence of service in their chosen vocation by presenting Pride Of Workmanship Awards.

The awards do not have strict

criteria regarding who they are presented to. Two years ago they were presented to upcoming apprentices and employees in the area. Last year police from the Hornsby Local Area Command were the recipients.

This year the awards went to local businesses which have proven through their longevity and success to be real assets to our community. By coincidence and entirely unplanned, they also happen to be family-run businesses spanning more than one generation.

The first recipient was Fine Impressions Printing. The business started in Pymble in 1994, initially as part of a franchise group called Pix Printing. When Pix Printing folded in 1999 the owner, Philip Greenwood, renamed

it Fine Impressions and the business continued.

As with all small businesses changes in the financial climate and keeping up with rapidly changing technology have presented challenges that Fine Im-

pressions have been able to meet.

After 18 years at the helm, in 2013 Phillip passed Fine Impressions to his son in law, Andrew Clarke.

Andrew has injected his youthful enthusiasm and technological expertise into the business and it has continued to provide top quality printing and copying.

(Philip and Andrew were unable to attend the club's meeting, but have been presented with the award separately.)



After immigrating to Australia from his native Iran, where he ran a similar business for many years, Harabed Haparati started **Sparks Auto Electrical** in Mosman in 1986, .

In 1989, he was joined in the business by his son Andre, upon his completion of a TAFE course,

In 1995 the business moved to the then Mobile Service Station on Mona Vale Road in St Ives. I first came across Sparks several years ago when, on many occasions, Andre and his father repaired my ageing work vehicle.

In 2011 when the station was remodelled and rebranded, and the workshop lease was not renewed, Harabed and Andre decided that they would turn the business into a mobile service that would come to the clients.

From recent work done on my son's car, I can vouch for the fact that they still offer the same quality of workmanship they did when they operated out of a workshop.

The loyal customer base and word of mouth has seen the business continue to be successful.

I would bet that the majority of people attending our awards night have at one time or another sampled a sweet from the **Du Plessy Pralin** shop. Until very recently, I thought that Du Plessy was the family name of the company.

Not so. The handsome gentleman in the picture here is Comte Du Plessy Pralin.

Among his numerous accomplishments, he was the person who was first able to turn cocoa powder into the chocolate that we know today.



The company was actually started by Marcelle and Martha Adan who had immigrated to Australia from a wartorn France. The Comte was an inspiration to Marcelle who was a trained chocolatier.

Marcelle and Martha started the business in the lower floor of the Petersons building in Pymble in 1961.

Following the death of his father in 1979, Paul Adan ran the company with his mother until her death 4 years

Du Plessy moved for several years to Turramurra and then to its present site in West Pymble.

Paul has expanded the range of products he sells and is continually adjusting the flavours of the chocolates to accommodate ever changing tastes.

To me, Du Plessy Pralin is an upper north shore institution that is synonymous with an amazing assortment of confectionery items.



Frank's Barber Shop, or more correctly **Frank's Ladies** and **Gents Style Cutting**, was already an institution when I first moved to Pymble 32 years ago.

The business was started by Frank Vittorino in Pymble in 1969, before moving to Gordon a few years later, first on Pacific Highway and then in its present location in St Johns Avenue.

Anthony Vittorino always wanted to be a part of the salon, and for 22 years worked alongside his father.

Over the past few years, the running of the shop was done by Anthony, as Frank went into semi-retirement.


The kids all knew that Franks used to give them a pack of rum after each baircut. While this has now been

In 1975 the first piece of sports memorabilia was given to Frank and placed on the shop wall. This inspired Frank to become an avid collector. I noticed that some of the newer additions now are autographed to Anthony, so it is good to see that he is continuing the tradition. Frank's shop seems always to be filled with conversation and laughter, and the fact that it does over 20,000 haircuts every year attests to its continued popularity.
