Michael McQueen video - Strategies for building membership

The Bobbin Head Cycle Classic is an example of a project for which we need more people to help develop it to its full potential.

In March this year we viewed Michael McQueen's video 'Engaging the next generation in Rotary', which provoked vigorous discussion about what the club could do to achieve that. In this follow up video, Michael talks about the steps Rotary clubs can take to increase their membership.

Michael is an expert in his field and a first rate speaker. His presentation will inspire you to devise ways to attract more people to become members of our club.

2014 Rotary International Convention

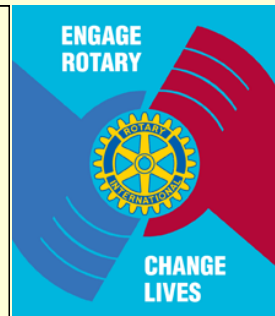
Sydney, Australia | 1-4 June 2014



The Rotary International Convention will be held at Sydney Olympic Park from 1-4 June 2014. It is expected that about 20,000 people will attend the Convention, from both Australia and overseas.

Dear Voluntary Helpers, Ku-ring-gai Rotary,

As you may remember, Lifeline's big **Annual Bookfair in Wahroonga** is our major fundraiser for the year. We want to thank you for your support over past years. Lifeline receives no regular government funding and relies heavily on the success of this event to continue to provide the essential services that they offer to the community.

The **bookfair** at Knox Grammar School this year is from **Thursday 10 July 2014 at 9.00 am to Sunday 13 July 2014, finishing at 5.00 pm**. We have a huge task to move all the stock from our **book depot at West Lindfield**, in the old Scout Hall at the corner of Polding and Ignatius Roads, up to Knox, and take the left-overs back again at the end of the Fair. We hope that you can help us again this year.

This year it will proceed like this:

- **Saturday 5 July 2014, at Lindfield, from 7.30 am to about 11.00 am** to load boxes into hire trucks and removal vans **using special conveyors**.
- **Saturday 5 July 2014, at Wahroonga from 9.30 am until early afternoon** to help unload boxes of books on to trestle tables, again using conveyors where possible.

N.B: Refreshments will be provided both at Lindfield and at Wahroonga

Sunday 13 July from 5.00 pm until about 8.00 pm.

Wahroonga - Loading truck with boxes to be returned to Lindfield.

- Loading trestles and frames into vans

Lindfield - Unloading trestles and frames into Scout Hall basement.

- Unloading books into Book Hall ready for Clearance Sale in August.

Wahroonga - Load all miscellaneous objects into van, and help unload at Lindfield.

- Restore hall ready for school next day

N.B: Refreshments will be provided afterwards.

Ku-ring-gai Rotarians: We would especially appreciate your help **at Wahroonga on Saturday 5 July from 9.30 am to about 1.00 pm** to unload books from the removalist van on to trolleys for placement on tables as appropriate. We will need **about 15 helpers** for this task, and will contact other clubs and service groups to assist also.

We also need as many as possible **from 5.00 pm to about 8.00 pm on Sunday 13 July** for loading boxes of left-overs into trucks, and trestle tables into vans and trucks, for return to various destinations. Also with **final**

cleaning jobs in the sale venue.

There are other tasks to be done in preparation for the arrival of boxes. **On Friday 4 July** we will need help **setting up trestles and tables in designated arrangements at Wahroonga**, so if **anyone is available on Friday**, please contact me and I will list your name for Andy, Barrie and Michael.

LIFELINE WEST LINDFIELD BOOKFAIR COMMITTEE

Last week: club forum

Enterprising President Tony asked for items of general business at the start of the meeting, so that anyone with an issue to raise didn't run out of time at the end. The stunned members couldn't think of anything.



Joy Newling gave the following update on the activities of the Youth Service Committee:

As well as our usual sponsorships, such as 2 teams to MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly), Nick Watt to RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Award) and prizes to Year 9 students at local high schools, we have supported many worthwhile programs for young people during this Rotary year.

We have 5 members assisting with RYDA (Rotary Youth Driver Awareness) in the next two weeks.

At Clarke Road School we presented a Role Model Award at the end of last year to Neha Sharma who was also elected as one of the School Captains which is great. At Clarke Road we are also donating funds to help erect fencing around the new senior playground. This was not included in the new build and it has become obvious that the senior students require their own place to engage them during break time.

At Camp Breakaway we are sponsoring one young person with high medical needs to a camp, and also a young carer or sibling of a disabled young person to their own camp.

We are still looking for applicants for the National Youth Science Forum in January, so if you know any year 11 students who are keen to pursue a career in science, engineering or similar, please refer them to the website and to contact us. Applications close on 31 May.

We are also sponsoring 2 children to attend an Operation Hope camp, and through Youth Insearch we are assisting young people to attend their weekend camps. We still have some money left in our budget, so if you know of a program for young people that you think is worth supporting, please let me know asap so we can look into it.



Greg Newling updated those present on the activities of the International Service Committee. Koongga will publish his summary of his report when received.

Ross Lambert reported on some of the activities of the Community Service Committee. He said that donations of laptop computers for 'The Lab' in Chatswood would



be welcome. The organisers have recruited 4 out of the required 16 mentors. Mentors need to be very 'IT savvy' - people such as programmers, network engineers, animators, etc. They should be between 20 - 28 years old and have lots of patience.

Regarding the Neringah Hospital kiosk, Ross said that the bifold doors had been installed and he was planning what was needed to finish the project.

In response to a question, Ross said he would enquire whether the Street Commodore organisation would like the club's assistance catering for another event.

President Tony said that, based on the first 3 years' results, the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic committee estimated that the event will raise \$180,000 to \$220,000 in 2015.



He also said that, owing to the lack of sufficient person-power in the 3 clubs which run the event, the question had been raised whether to bring in another Rotary club. An informal vote showed that the members were overwhelmingly opposed to the idea. Points made in the ensuing discussion included:

- The 3 clubs got only half the number of volunteers required to run the event.
- There should be detailed job descriptions, including indications of the amount of time required, to help manage allocation of roles amongst the clubs' existing personnel.
- The Rotary Club of St Ives should continue to be involved because the event goes through its area. Better allocation of roles would help to get its members more involved.
- Incentives might be offered to attract more volunteers.

A suggestion from President Tony that the 15km ride be abandoned, because it requires too many personnel and other resources, was vigorously opposed. The ride attracts a lot of local community involvement and is hugely popular with children.

Ideas for additional beneficiaries of the funds raised by the Cycle Classic included Clarke Road School, Youth In Search, The Lab and the women's refuge proposed for the North Shore.

A proposal to change the name of the Cycle Classic which had been the subject of email exchanges between the club members was discussed and left to be explored further.

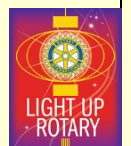
