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

Malcolm Noad

'Working for Rupert Murdoch'

Malcolm spent 31 years working for News Limited, as well as serving as Chief Executive Officer of the Canterbury Bulldogs Rugby League Club and Chairman of the

National Rugby League.

Ignoring his father's advice to stick to a safe but dull career with the Water Board, Malcolm got himself a position as a copy boy in the advertising department of 'The Australian' newspaper. He was hired on the strength of his declaration that he wanted to join a company where hard work and enthusiasm (and a reasonable amount of intelligence) could give him the opportunity to work his way up the corporate ladder. And so it proved in practice.

Malcolm joined 'The Aus' when it was only 9 years old and expected to close at any moment due to its unprofitability. Fortunately the company was led by a visionary who believed that Australia was large enough and mature enough to have its own national newspaper. Many years later it made its first profit and in July this year the paper will celebrate its 50th year.

At 28 Malcolm was promoted to run Teleclassifieds at a time when computers were just about to take over from typewriters. This was the beginning of the 'sweet spot' of the publishing industry. It was before the internet and what Malcolm calls 'unsocial' media, but at the beginning of the production technology boom where there was massive investment in colour printing presses, new printing plants and advanced pre-press production capability. It was a great time to be in the newspaper industry and Malcolm thrived on it. He created 'Kelly at the Tele', who did her job so well that he was made Assistant Advertising Director. Three years later he moved to Perth for 5 years as General Manager of the Sunday Times, Rupert Murdoch's division in WA.

In 1994 Malcolm returned to Sydney to run the NSW newspaper division, which included The Australian, The Daily Telegraph and the Sunday Telegraph. It was also just prior to the Super League 'war', which he became heavily involved in. It was an incredibly challenging yet

exciting time, juggling the demands of running a large newspaper division, helping to establish the Super League competition and ultimately going on to be on the Board and Chairman of the NRL when the ARL and Super League merged.

Subsequently Malcolm was promoted to Group General Manager, Newspapers, responsible for all of Rupert Murdoch's newspapers in Australia. At the time newspapers were still on the rise and circulations were increasing if the right amount of editorial and marketing skill were employed. Malcolm commented that it is far more difficult now, in the age of the internet.


Malcolm's immediate bosses, Ken Cowley and Bob Muscat, were inspirational, engendering a culture of loyalty, hard work and opportunism. No doubt this was as a result of the way Rupert Murdoch ran the company. Malcolm said he experienced his 'whack and pat' method of management many times - a 'whack' when you thought you were on top of your game and you were a bit full of yourself and a 'pat' when things were tough and you needed support. Although Malcolm saw and experienced the opinionated, aggressive side of Rupert (but, he said, what successful business person doesn't have that?), he also had the pleasure of experiencing the charming, polite, down to earth, humble, attention to detail and informed side of him as well.

Malcolm related several stories about the nice and not so nice people he encountered during his time in the newspaper business. But only the newspapers he ran would be game to publish them.

Rotary International Convention

Malcolm Braid writes:

Breakout Sessions

I attended several of the breakout sessions and a summary of each follows.

Shortening the Gap Between Rotaract and Rotary

Only 3% of Rotaract members transfer to Rotary when they reach 30. The session discussed a variety of aspects related to why Rotaract members don't see Rotary as an option and what some Districts/clubs are doing to bridge the gap

Some of the reasons for not transferring are:

- Unclear of what the process of advancing to Rotary is.
- Time and money requirements.
- Will the Rotary club be 'an action ' club?

- Who will be my friends (the demographics)?
- Which club is best for me?
- Rotary is seen as an exclusive club.
- When Rotary asks for Rotaractors' involvement it's always as ' labourers' only.

Some of the initiatives implemented by Rotary Clubs to bridge the gap are:

- Rotaract members attend Rotary District conferences and are allocated time to make presentations.
- Rotary pays the conference fees for attendees.
- Rotary invites Rotaract speakers to their meetings to outline projects, etc.
- Rotary club hosts evenings for Rotaractors reaching 30 and encouraging them to transfer.
- Encourage attendance at each other's meetings, events, fundraisers.
- Provide open invitations to attend Rotary meetings....some only ask the Rotaract members to pay a nominal dinner fee (\$5).
- Invite Rotaract President/Sec to Rotary Board meetings (and visa versa).
- Mentors allocated to assist in professional connections.
- · Host an annual event with Rotaract.
- When the Rotaract members are inducted to Rotary invite other Rotaractors to attend at a subsidised rate.
- Have the chairman of the Rotary New Generations/ Youth Avenue of Service committeee meet regularly with his/her counterpart in Rotaract.
- Attend each other's meetings regularly.
- Create a fellowship where young Rotary members (under 35) to meet with Rotaract members.
- Create opportunities for both to work on projects together.
- Financial discount in first year to join Rotary.

Rotaract and Rotary: Learning Together to Serve Together

This session covered some of the points above but also had extra ideas - for example:

- See Rotaractors as a valuable resource, not just an extra body when working on projects.
- Ask Rotaractors to be part of the project committees.

- Stop the parent/child relationship.
- Change the mindset.
- Be welcoming.
- Mentor Rotaractors.
- Have Rotaractors part of the planning.
- Help them manage risk.
- Charge Rotaractors a smaller dinner fee.

Suggestions for both to consider:

- A sporting challenge between the two, e.g., table tennis, ten pin bowling.
- Each attends the other's meetings on a rotation basis or similar. (Sound familiar? Ed.)
- Quarterly meetings together.
- Debate night.
- Mentoring opportunities.
- Board member on each other's committees.

These two sessions provided some wonderful ideas for our Youth Committee to follow up.

Bringing the FUN back

Roger Desmarchelier has already commented on this session (*Koongga 9 June 2014 - Ed.*) However I noted a few points myself, as follows:

- Have a Fun meter and determine where we are.
- Singing to warm the soul!!
- Direct relationship between membership and Fun.
- Giving is Fun.
- Only 10% of Rotarians are under 45 years.
- Young people want flexibility.
- Members leave because they are not having fun.
- Need to ENGAGE with all members.
- Obnoxious and annoying members need to move on.
- Have a photographer. (We do and he does a great job Ed.)
- Have more female members.
- Skype with clubs overseas in the same time zone.
- Rolling slide show while meeting is on showing past activities/projects, next week's speaker, new members, etc. (Koongga in motion! Ed.)
- Use social media. (President Tony's onto it Ed.)
- Make meeting room inviting and presentable with Rotary material. (*I think he means flags, banners, etc.*— *Ed.*)
- Good food.
- Greeters at the door each meeting.
- Have 1 minute interludes.
- Present solid gold medallions for special achievements.
- Have a Director of FUN.
- Encourage makeups at other clubs/Rotary events.
- Different seating of members each week.
- Celebrations and recognitions, e.g., Valentines Day.
- Family night with children/grandchildren/brothers/ sisters/etc. invited.
- Fun activities like 3 truths and a lie.

Vocational Service: A Kaleidoscope of Projects

This session showcased several successful projects from NSW.

- Rotary Police Awards
- Rotary Worldskills Partnership
- · Rotary Emergency Services Awards

All the above projects were managed by the Rotary Clubs in the Illawarra and presentations were in the form of short videos.

Preparing Your Club for the Future: Club Visioning and Assessment

This breakout session was the least enjoyable. In essence the moderators (from Rotary International headquarters in Chicago) showed the various tools created on the web site for clubs to access.

Primarily the focus was to ensure that clubs regularly assess how 'healthy' they are and assess the strengths and challenges they face and how to create a shared vision and strategic plan.

The session could have been over in 30 minutes, it was dragged it out for 2 hours. As the final plenary session was happening after this breakout session, one just sat and passed the time.

Other activities and events

We provided a homestay for Prem and Sacha from Norway. They arrived a day later than planned, due to the Beijing officials requiring them to have a visa for Australia before leaving.


