Frank White Kandos Cement Works demolition and land remediation

In his early career as an engineer in South Africa, Frank White worked on construction of large industrial facilities for power generation. After moving to Australia in 1989 he worked as a senior executive in fields as varied as civil engineering, furniture manufacture, warehousing and logistics.

For the past 3 years Frank has been project manager for Cement Australia, supervising the demolition and rehabilitation of its very large industrial site at Kandos, between Lithgow and Mudgee. In this talk he will describe the challenges of the project and the methods used to safely remove the massive infrastructure and rehabilitate the land.

Bobbin Head Cycle Classic

Bob Elsworth gave a brief overview of the BHCC (nicknamed the Bobbo). mainly for the benefit of our newer members.

Although the event isn't until late March next year, there are a number bobbin head of things that have to be put in place now to meet key dates – especially in the sponsorship, marketing and registration / fundraising areas.



This cycling event takes part in a glorious part of Sydney through the Kuring-gai National Park. Bob provided a preview of a short video that has been made to assist in marketing the event.

Three Rotary clubs are directly involved in delivering the BHCC – namely Ku ring gai, Turramurra and St Ives. There is current talk within the Executive Committee about inviting another club to assist with the volunteering and to provide additional skills.

The purpose of the Bobbo is to raise much needed funds for 4 key charities - Lifeline, Ku-ringgai Youth Development Service, Eagles RAPS and Bo Children's Hospital in Sierra Leone West Africa. Next year will be its fourth year of operation. From humble beginnings of

raising \$25k in 2012, it raised over \$130k this year and we are optimistic that it will raise around \$200k next year.

Judging by the steadily increasing number of cyclists since the

event was first run in 2012, we expect to attract around 2500 riders next year based on the current trend.


Funds are raised generally in 3 ways: corporate sponsorships, a proportion of rider fees and fundraising by cyclists. We've had a little difficulty signing corporate sponsorships for next year's event at this stage. However, a lot of effort is currently going into this right now. If any member, can provide a lead as to a likely sponsor of the event, please advise either Jack McCartney, Tony or Bob so that they can follow up.

The BHCC requires many people to assist both prior and during the event. Some have to be paid eg Police and SES. However, the majority is made up of volunteers from Rotary club members and the charity

partners. Next year we hope to get volunteer organisations involved to make up the shortfall that we experienced this year.

Five rides will be offered next year – namely a 104 km, 80 km, 57 km, 27 km and an 11 km. Experienced

cyclists can rise to the challenge of the 104 km ride from Turramurra via Bobbin Head to West Head and Akuna Bay. Or they can do the less onerous 80 km ride, which leaves out the undulating 24 km West Head leg. For those not used to longer distances, there is a more moderate 57 km ride taking in Bobbin Head then out to Terrey Hills and back. For social riders, who don't like to tax themselves physically, the new 27 km ride through Bobbin Head should hit the spot. And families, who would just like to enjoy the experience of this event, can take the 11 km ride through Wahroonga only.

A new component of the event last year was a time trialed section from Akuna Bay to the Cottage Point gates. This proved a huge success, so is being offered again next year - only this time from the bridge at Bobbin Head to the Park toll booth at the end of Bobbin Head Road

According to an online survey of the 2014 year riders, 98% of those who responded, rated the event as either 'terrific' or 'pretty good' - a great response in terms of rider satisfaction.

The online survey further indicated that 95% of the 2014 year riders who responded would either 'definitely' or 'probably' return next year.

Bob gave a brief overview of the management structure for the event, but said it was only the tip of the iceberg because there are a range of Team Leader roles within the separate components. Bob has been actively trying to recruit team leaders for a range of marketing tasks. Virtually all Team Leaders for Marketing are in place, other than for the Promotions and Public Relations role. So, if you feel they could offer assistance with this and would like to be involved, please contact Bob.

Education week



Linda Lam-Rohlfs Information security

Linda gave as a 'high-level overview' of information security issues. She described theft of information as 'the perfect crime', the key features being:

- Motive: financial gain
- Opportunity: a huge population, 40% using the inter-
- Means: technology which changes frequently, exposing new means of illicit access

Criminals seek:

- Financial gain through identity theft and access to credit cards and bank accounts
- To prevent businesses operating, using 'ransomware'
- Personal data and industrial secrets for many purpos-

Using only 3 forms of identity criminals can get loans in another person's name.

Criminal organisations have collected huge numbers of stolen user name and password combinations, often

gathered from small websites and by hacking into personal computers, using 'trojans', 'key logging' and 'phishing' techniques.

Linda provided the following tips to avoid becoming a victim of internet crime:



- Use smart password protection, such as whole phrases without spaces between words
- Use virus protection on every mobile device, including tablet computers and smart phones
- · Don't visit 'dodgy' websites
- Avoid the unknown e.g., other people's USB flash drives
- Be alert for 'phishing' emails

Linda recommended a range of things that everyone can do to protect their information, including:

- Back up your data frequently (so that it can be restored easily if access to your device is stopped)
- Update the privacy settings on your phone
- Reduce your digital footprint (e.g., not using social networks)
- Leave loyalty programs and reward cards if you don't really need them
- · Treat contactless payment cards like cash
- Use messaging 'apps', which are better than Skype e.g., Blackberry Messenger, which is free, includes video calling, can be used on Blackberry, IOS, Android and Windows phones and has triple DES en-



• Remember: if it's on the internet, it is not private








Complete security

John Aitken Marine Rescue NSW

John spoke about his voluntary work as a member of

Marine Rescue NSW (MR). He is a member of both a boat crew and a radio base.

John showed a series of slides and photos of MR activities, base locations, boats used by MR and the range of radios used on the boats and in the radio base. He discussed updating the radio system to ROIP (radio over internet protocol).

The Cottage Point base is a weekend, daylight only, operation. The radio base MR Sydney is a 24 x 7 operation. Other bases north and south of Sydney operate 7 day operations with 24 hour radio coverage with daytime

boat coverage and call out at other times. The Hawkesbury base does a large number of ambulance-type operations. MR Sydney also covers the Monaro region (Eden, Bateman Bay and Narooma) overnight.

Extensive equipment upgrades are happening, including



a change of corporate colours from yellow to white. Vessels have differing capability, depending on the nature of incidents and water likely to be encountered. Some are fast and light for inshore and others much larger and heavier

for offshore work.

Members undergo extensive and high standard training. The range of rescues MR has been involved with includes tows, putting vessels into marinas, complex first aid cases, search and rescues including meeting up with helicopter teams. John also discussed how funds were raised, including discussing the difficulty receiving payments from grateful 'customers'.
