Chris Golis Emotional intelligence

Emotional Intelligence is achieving self- and social mastery by being smart with core emotions. Your core emotions depend on your temperament, which is the genetic part of your personality and drives around

two-thirds of your behaviour. The other third depends on your nurture. The problem is most managers and sales people do not have a scientifically valid and reliable model of temperament which is the best way of improving your emotional intelligence. This talk introduces what Chris Golis believes is the best and most practical temperament model available: the Humm-Wadsworth.

Chris is a graduate of Cambridge and the London Business School. After successful careers in IT and venture capital, where he was the director of some 30 private and public companies, Chris is now engaged in a Third Age career as professional speaker and workshop leader based on his eleven published books positioning himself as Australia's expert in *practical emotional intelligence*. He is President of the Cambridge Society of NSW and an adjunct lecturer at the S P Jain Business School.

News from the west


Hi Michael

Rotary Youth Leadership Award



RYLA is a one-week leadership training program for young adults 18-26. RYLA next year will be held at Vision Valley, Arcadia from

Sunday 11 to Saturday 17 January 2015.

RYLA commenced in Queensland in 1959 and has spread throughout the Rotary world. It started in our District in 1970. Many young people who have attended RYLA have described it as a life-changing experience. It has benefited them as leaders in their local community volunteer activities and in their careers and business dealings. It is a powerful and valuable program.

Our District 9685 is looking for 80+ participants and our club intends to sponsor one. Sponsorship cost of \$815

covers accommodation, meals, presentations, workshops and activities in behavioural analysis, negotiation and conflict resolution, public speaking, selfmotivation and goal setting, group dynamics and team building and community service.



We are looking for applicants! Would you like to nominate someone who meets the following criteria?

- Young adults 18 to 26 years of age and at least one year out of school.
- Young leaders in the community or those who aspire to leadership
- Young adults seriously committed to development of their leadership skills

Young leaders from sporting clubs, Scouts & Guides, church groups, surf clubs, businesses, tertiary institutions and all community groups

To date we have not received any nominations, so your Youth Committee needs help from club members to nominate potential RYLA participants. We need to receive nominations and conduct interviews by mid-October.

Last week - club business meeting

Never one to stick to convention, President Tony started last week's meeting by asking for questions, comments and proposals. After a tentative start, the contributions ranged far and wide. Following is a summary of the key



points:

 Graham Maslen: has an international service project to propose, but the club should have made its plans before July. September is too late.
 The club should be more pro-

active.

- David Forsythe: enquired whether the club has set its budgets for the year. President Tony responded that they were to be set during the meeting.
- Graham Maslen: commented that the club had gained good exposure at the Light the Night event.
- David Forsythe (as the club's auditor): said he had been cajoling the Treasurer to get financial statements out to members, because they have not been receiving regular reports on what the club is doing. Figures give the broad picture, but regular reports to club meetings is what is needed. The annual statements for 2013/14 are not yet ready to be audited.
- Michael Tyler: complimented the Treasurer for presenting clearer than usual draft financial statements for 2013/14, but said the meeting needed to have received year to date figures for 2014/15. Budgets should have been ready at the start of the year on 1 July.



- Greg Newling: wants more ideas for raising funds for the many additional projects that the club could undertake, rather than relying largely on the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic and Gordon Market.
- Graham Timms: said the club should first determine what projects to undertake and then work out how to raise the required funds. The Avenues of Service committees should be planning both aspects.
- Joy Newling: reminded the meeting that each member is a volunteer and can only devote his/her available spare time to Rotary activities.
- Jack McCartney: thinks that the club performs very well and has no need to be hard on itself.
- John Aitken: cautioned against the splitting the club's efforts into too many parts and endorsed the current major projects (Lifeline, Eagles RAPS and the Women's Refuge).
- Ross Lambert: agreed the need for a common cause and agreement on expenditure and emphasised the importance of establishing the Women's Refuge.
- Michael Tyler: reminded the club of the need to examine all aspects of the way it operates and presents itself and considering making changes so as to make the club more attractive to the next generation.
- Graham Maslen (as Treasurer): called on those who have not done so to pay their annual club dues.
- Graham Timms (as Director

 Rotary Foundation): spoke
 about the Foundation as a
 source of project funds and
 reminded members that
 their contributions as



'Centurions' and the club's own contributions come back to the District for project purposes 3 years later. The Foundation had/will contribute funds for the Tick Awareness project, the Neringah Hospital project \$3,000 out of \$7,000) and the Lao water project (\$47,000 out of \$81,000).

- President Tony: said he wants to improve the 'fireside chat' introduction to Rotary for prospective members and to simplify the new member induction ceremony.
- Greg Newling: said that the induction ceremony should be special and memorable for new members.
- Lou Coenen: observed that President Tony and Greg Newling were saying the same thing and what was needed was an efficient induction ceremony.

Avenues of Service reports International Service

Greg Newling presented the International Service Committee's report (published in last week's Koongga).



- Graham Maslen: said the Board had some questions about the committee's proposals and that there was a need to increase the number or scale of the club's international projects.
- Lou Coenen: asked what the club is doing about the African ebola epidemic and mentioned that refugees from the fighting in the Middle East are being provided with ShelterBoxes.
- Graham Timms: said that Bo Hospital in Sierra Leone is converting a ward to an isolation ward and our club may be asked to contribute funding.

Youth Service



Joy Newling presented the Youth Service Committee plan for 2014-15 (see next item) and called for nomination of candidates for Rotary Youth Leadership Awards urgently (see item page 2).

Community Service

Ross Lambert said that the Community Service Committee is working on proposals for 3 new projects, as follows:



- Publication of a 40 page carol book for St Ives Carols in the Park, funded by advertising.
- An Art Union to raise funds for the Women's Refuge, selling 1,000 tickets @ \$100 each via the internet for a Mercedes Benz 180.
- A community fireworks display at St Ives Showground.

Youth Service plan 2014/15

This is the outline of the draft Youth Service plan for 2014/15:

- Present Benefic Awards to Year 9 students at Killara, Turramurra and Ku-ring-gai Creative Arts High Schools.
- Clarke Road School present Role Model Award, assist with resources, volunteers for reading, Education Week, etc.
- Rotary Youth Leadership Award sponsor one young person to RYLA in January 2015 – nominations please.



- Rotary Youth Driver Awareness volunteers to assist on nominated days, help students in need to participate.
- Rotary Youth Program of ENrichment – approach local high

schools for nominations of students to participate in RYPEN at Collaroy in February or Springwood in June



- Youth Insearch donation to assist young people to attend weekend program: assistance may be needed with catering 2015.
- Rotaract encourage joint activities, foster closer relationship.
- Model United Nations Assembly sponsor 2 teams from Pymble Ladies College and Killara High School.
- Camp Breakaway sponsor one young carer or sibling to camp and one disabled young person to camp.



- Operation Hope sponsor one young person to 5 day Wilderness camp.
- · Assist West Pymble Guides?
- Interact improve contact with Interact Club at Pymble Ladies College possible joint project?
- Donation to assist Nicola Allan with honours research project aimed at helping children with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder develop their pro-social behaviour.
- Life Education donation.

- Support Community project "The Lab" with new branch starting at Chatswood, maybe with laptops?

World's biggest dinner party


Umoja Orphanage project – Kenya


