Hornsby/Ku-ring-gai Women's Shelter

Support of the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Women's Shelter is one of our club's major projects at present - assisting with purchase and fitout of the shelter.

The purposes of the shelter include:

- Provision of temporary supported accommodation for women in times of crisis such as homelessness and / or domestic violence.
- Provision of a safe non-threatening environment for women that will assist them through their emotional and physical crisis.

John Lockyer is chairman of the HKWS' steering committee and Annabelle Daniel is CEO of women's community shelters. Their visit to our club will be the first time that we have heard directly from the organisers about their work and the shelter.




Volunteers are sought to hand out flyers for the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic to participants in the 'Gong ride next Sunday 2 November.

YWAM - Overcoming the Impossible

Dear Ku-ring-gai Rotary Club,

I'm writing in regard to the YWAM Training and Medical Ship's 'Overcoming the Impossible' tour visiting Sydney, on October 18th through to December 4th.

YWAM Medical Ships - Australia (YWAM MSA) is a charity that provides global opportunities for volunteers to care, connect, serve and build with individuals and communities; particularly addressing health care and training needs in Papua New Guinea.

A current snapshot of Papua New Guinea (PNG) shows:

- An estimated five women in PNG die in childbirth every day
- **Ywam** medicalships
- 1 in 13 children die before the age of five
- 43% of PNG's population is under the age of 15...a quarter of whom will not live to reach 40.

Over the last 5 years, YWAM MSA volunteers have gone into remote areas of PNG via its vessel *MV Pacific Link*, achieving over 180,000 health, training and community development outputs. YWAM MSA's is launching its **new vessel** that will replace the 35 year-old Pacific Link during the *Overcoming the Impossible* tour.

During the ship's visit to Sydney, we will be hosting a range of events and meetings onboard - aimed at raising awareness about the critical health needs in PNG, recruiting volunteers and raising funds. We will also have the ship open to the public on the weekends for tours.

Should you be interested, we would love to offer to host a meeting on board the MV Ammari itself and offer private tours for your members following the meeting if they wish. As an alternative, representatives are available to give presentations to your club that help articulate our vision for Papua New Guinea.

Dave Everett School For Life update

Dave Everett started his presentation by showing the video that you can view at http://schoolforlife.org.au/about/our-story/

Dave was born in Botswana; grew up in the Hills District of Sydney; studied marine biology at Sydney University; decided it wasn't for him; and returned to Africa to carry out a variety of projects in Kenya.

While in Africa Dave met Annabelle Chauncy. She grew up in the Southern Highlands of NSW; studied arts/law



at Sydney University; and went to Africa to work on aid projects.

Dave and Annabelle decided that they wanted to set up their own charity to provide education as a way of breaking the poverty cycle in Africa. With the assistance of a board of directors from the 'big end of town' they gained the support and credibility they needed to make the School For Life Foundation a success.

In Uganda 49% of the population of 33 million is aged less than 14. The vast majority are uneducated and unskilled. The typical village school is a disused cattle pen with a bare earth floor, no furniture and draughty slatted sides, rather than walls.

Early on Dave and Annabelle exceeded their expectations and raised \$110,000 at a function in Sydney. They then worked with the national and district governments of Uganda, focussing on asking what the local community wanted.

The result was Katuuso Primary and Vocational School, whose motto 'Nezikookolima' means 'every great rooster came from an egg'. The school now has 220 children in classes from kindergarten to Year 4, including disabled children.

To overcome endemic disease problems, the Foundation installed a fresh water bore, which provides clean water for the whole local community. The school also provides a nutritious feeding program for the children, which overcomes the lack of food at home, which adversely affected the children's ability to concentrate at school.



Dave told us about:

- A person who was employed as a cleaner and subsequently became a teacher at the school.
- Quarterly health care visits by medical staff from Kampala.
- Epileptic children who were fitting 3 times a day, but whose condition has been brought under control with medication.
- A school trip to a zoo, the highlight of which was the sight of Lake Victoria - a body of water beyond the children's comprehension.
- Solar electricity, installed with the help of our club and others, enabling the use of computers, refrigerators,

freezers and lights for night classes.

 A tailoring program established with the aid of SewAid International, which has enabled the women involved to quadruple their income. The proceeds of sale of



products such as kimonos, aprons and makeup bags go back into the program.

• Cash crops of chilli and coffee, which the Foundation is now exporting to Europe.

The Foundation has recently acquired a new site at nearby Bujuuko, on which it plans to build another primary school and a secondary school. At the new site an animal husbandry facility has been established, raising goats (the Foundation's 'lawnmowers') and pigs for sale.



Answering questions, Dave said:

- Graduates of the schools have the potential to develop careers in many fields, including engineering and medicine.
- Katuuso school has to turn away half its applicants.
- In due course the sewing ladies will manufacture school uniforms.
- There are 1,000 residents in the locality of Katuuso.
- The people in the area suffers from malaria and typhoid.
- The Katuuso water bore has problems at present. The Foundation plans to replace it with a roofwater harvesting system.
- Eventually the 3 schools will accommodate 1,200 students

In proposing a vote of thanks, Past President Roger Desmarchelier presented a cheque for \$3,000 from the club to the Foundation.


