Darcy Sharpe and Oregon his Guide Dog
Introduction— Bob Elsworth

Darcy previously worked in State and Federal Government—Living with a guide dog and visual impairment

He started his presentation with a tour of the room with Oregon and said he is pleased we have lady members in our club

Darcy is interested in the miracle of Guide dog training Zero to 20 months – being trained as a guide dog, then bonding

Darcy GD (Guide Dog) Born in Victoria July 2009 in Victoria. After 2 months Darcy was introduced to his starting family

He was sent to a family to move him in a direction of becoming a guide Dog, they are trained to always on the left and slightly in front. They look after diet grooming and health and customisation to sounds obstacles and sights

You don't give a command to a GD—always a request starting with his name

They taught him to sit and stay

If there are any signs of aggression the dog cannot be a GD

Between 4 and 7 months males are castrated and females at 12 months so as not to be distracted. At the end of 13 months he was transferred to 5 months of intensive training. His feet were introduced to all surfaces and obstacles, how to handle rail stations and steps

Guide Dogs NSW decides when to retire the dog.

If a dog is abused it is taken from the "handler"

The harness is introduced very slowly so the dog has a chance to experience it

Dogs don't see colour and at crossings they look at the light and listen to the sound

They are also trained to cross the road without lights and they will wait for the opportunity

They will look for the sliced part of a curb

GD is trained to enter a train and they always sit at the end

GD have different methods to asking people to offer a seat, some very persuasive.

DG helps to develop a sense of humour

Graduation day, is a thrill for the trainers and those who raised the dog.

When you receive your first dog a person arrives to train the recipient and dog.

For 30 years he used a long cane, no GPS etc and he was known as a (cane) tapper

GD's are trained to enter shopping centres, on and off escalators, the GD is trained to jump at start and end of an escalator so they don't catch their pads.

Bonding, firstly a 2k walk every day, then toast no butter, then a multi grain weetbix, one hour later fish and potato, but always at a different time. If they are fed the same time they get into the habit they will want to go home at meal time.

Darcy is groomed every day, then given a rub with a nylon stocking to bring out the wax and oil

Oregon loves classical music, in a recital hall he groans with approval

Catching train and going to Angle place—once Darcy has visited a location once he remembers and knows where to return.

In a major breakthrough in the world Polio Eradication campaign, it was announced on Friday that Nigeria has now gone ONE YEAR with NO new cases of the wild poliovirus!

Making the announcement, Rotary International senior leaders – President Ravi Ravindran and The Rotary Foundation Chairman Ray Klinginsmith – pointed out that it was only a decade ago that polio struck 12,631 people in Africa – three quarters of all cases in the world. President Ravindran and Chairman Klinginsmith congratulated Rotarians around the world who have now donated \$688.5 million to fight polio throughout Africa, including more than \$200 million in Nigeria.

Official sources state that with the infrastructure put in place by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), Nigeria not only reduced its polio caseload by 90% in 2014, but also thwarted the world's most lethal Ebola outbreak to day in only 90 days – a response faster than even the USA, and rightly praised by the World Health Organisation as 'world class'.

If the stringent World Health Organisation testing criteria are met, Nigeria could be removed from the list of polio-endemic countries in September this year, leaving just Pakistan and Afghanistan as the only two remaining polio-endemic countries.

District 9685 Rotary Foundation Chairman PDG Tony Castley added his congratulations to those of our world leaders and urged District TRF Chairman and Club Presidents not to take the situation for granted.

"We must continue to intensify our fund raising efforts and increase public awareness that Rotary and its global partners are winning the war against Polio!

"Protecting progress achieved to date means enhancing surveillance, routine immunisation, and community engagement in Nigeria and other countries where transmission has been stopped," he said.

Chairman Tony urged his TRF Chairman to take advantage of this excellent news and double their efforts with District clubs leading into and during TRF month in November.

"We need to encourage ALL Rotarians to take an interest in the campaign and share the good news with their communities and neighbourhoods. Visit www.endpolio.org to download a toolkit of materials to help promote our Polio Eradication campaign," he added.
