This week: Michael Harvey: The creation of Action Stations



Last November the Australian Maritime Museum in Darling Habour opened its new 'Actions Stations' exhibit, which gives visitors a close up experience of what happens when a ship's crew is called to 'action stations'.

Michael Harvey, Assistant Director of Public Engagement and Research – Australian National Maritime Museum will tell us how the exhibit was put together.

Michael has worked in the fields of museums and science communication for 20 years. Previously he worked as Head of Exhibitions at the Australian Museum and at the Natural History Museum in London, where he managed science communication programs and developed concepts for new galleries.

He has also travelled around Australia as a member and a coordinator of the *Shell Questacon Science Circus*, has taught in Museum Studies at the universities of Leicester and Sydney, and is a past president of Australasian Network of Science and Technology Exhibitors.

Tony McClelland reported that 2,320 riders registered for the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic and were very appreciative of the assistance provided by the volunteers who organised, managed and marshalled the event.



Last meeting: Neil Howie: The Rotary Foundation



Last week District Foundation Zone Representative Neil Howie gave us the most lucid explanation of The Rotary Foundation's ('TRF') system of District and Global grants anyone present could remember hearing.

Neil noted that our club has been successful in getting grants for Katuuso School in Uganda and the Lao villages

water supply project. Although difficulty has been had obtaining a grant for another project, he urged us not to give up. He also it is important that the club members continue to donate to the Foundation through the Centurion system.

Global grants

Global grants are large grants administered by TRF. They can be a club project grant, support for a vocational training team or scholarships.

TRF programs include fully funded 'Peace Fellows' and Polio Plus, which is Rotary's first priority.

Larger projects (\$30,000+):

- Must be long-term projects
- Can be awarded up to \$200,000
- Must be sustainable, with measurable outcomes
- Must align with 6 areas of focus
- Attract a minimum of \$15,000 'matching funds'
- Can be applied for online by Rotary clubs

The 6 areas of focus are:

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- · Water and sanitation
- · Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

Neil gave an example of a Global Grant with a \$10,000 contribution from 'District Designated Funds' ('DDF'):

Club cash	DDF	TRF match*	Total
\$10,000		\$5,000	\$15,000
	\$10,0000	\$10,000	\$20,000
Total		\$15,000	\$35,000

* The TRF match must be at least \$15,000

The \$10,000 DDF contribution is ideally made up of \$7,000 from the District 9685 District Designated Fund and \$3,000 from the overseas District involved in the project.

DDF comprise 50% of the money contributed to TRF by

clubs in the District, which is returned to the District by TRF 3 years after its contribution to TRF.



Multiple clubs can be involved. Funding for the solar system for Katuuso School (above), which cost \$54,000, was provided as follows:

- Host Club: Rotary Club of Mengo (cash?) and District (DDF?)
- International club: Rotary Club of Altona (cash) and District 9800 (DDF of \$1 for \$2)
- Other partner clubs: Rotary E-Club of Greater Sydney (cash) and Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai (Cash \$3,000) and District 9680 (DDF)

The total funding of \$54,000 came from:

- 3 Australian clubs and 2 Districts contributing DDFs (Total: \$27,000); and
- Global Grant to match club cash and DDF (\$27,000).

Similarly a Ugandan water supply and sanitation project which cost \$US310,000 was funded by:

- Contributions from 21 international clubs in 8 countries and their 17 Districts (DDF) totalling US\$184,000; and
- TRF matching grant of US\$126,000.

Since 'Future Vision' started in June 2012 clubs in our District have received the following funding from TRF:

•	Global Grants - 19 approved	\$ 778,917
•	Global Grants - 17 in process	\$ 327,392
•	Total Foundation funding	\$1,106,209
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Total value of Global Grant projects US\$2,761,830

District Grants

District Grants are for educational and humanitarian activities consistent with Rotary's mission statement "To do Good in the World". Features of such grants are:

- They are available for smaller activities and projects
- The projects can be local or international
- There is a simple application approved by District
- They are managed by District
- Grants can be up to \$5,000 for international projects and \$2,500 projects within Australia
- Projects must be completed in the Rotary Year
- In 2015-16 District has given out 38 grants totaling \$92,500

An example of the use of District grants is the Hills-Kellyville Dalamas school amenities project in the Philippines.



Following the devastating Typhoon Sendong in the Philippines, the Rotary Clubs of The Hills-Kellyville District 9685 and Illigan City District 3780 formed a partnership with a local group and with the help of a District Grant for \$5,000 a school toilet block was completed.

In the same period the funds by clubs in District 9685 amounted to US\$343,520

Funding the TRF

There are 4 ways for Rotarians and Rotary clubs to contribute to TRF:

- The Annual Fund (e.g., contributions by Centurions) for support of TRF today. Contributions are tax deductible and the funds come back to the clubs.
- The Endowment Fund, securing the future of TRF. Contributions to this are not tax deductible in Australia.
- Polio Plus (Rotary's current priority). Contributions are tax deductible.
- The Bequest Society, enabling people to leave funds to TRF in their wills, thus helping to secure the future of TRF. There are 21 members of the Society in District 9685.

District 9685's target for contributions to the Annual Fund in 2015-16 is US\$450,000, as follows:

•	2,000 Centurions x A\$100	US\$150,000 (members)
•	70 Paul Harris Fellows	\$70,000 (members)
•	Major donors	\$60,000 (members)
•	78 clubs x \$2,200 average	\$170,000 (clubs)
•	Total	\$450,000

Our club's recent contributions were:

In 2014-15 TRF put 92% of the funds into Rotary programs. Only 2% is spent on administration and only 6% on promotion.

The Challenge

774 MILLION PEOPLE

in the world are illiterate—about 16% of the world's adults. Of the illiterate, 2/3 are women and 250 million are children.

61 MILLION PRIMARY SCHOOL-AGED CHILDREN

are out of school. The majority live in Asia and sub-Saharan Africa.

5.4 MILLION TEACHERS

are needed to achieve universal primary education by 2015, more than 1/3 of them in sub-Saharan Africa.

97 COUNTRIES

have not achieved gender parity at the secondary school level.

Our Results

Our Programs

Our Literacy program enables primary school children to become independent readers. Room to Read focuses its efforts on developing reading skills and the habit of reading in primary school-aged children because literacy is the foundation for all future learning. We do this by establishing school libraries, publishing original children's books in local languages, constructing child-friendly classrooms and supporting educators with training and resources to teach reading, writing and active listening more effectively.

Our Girls' Education program supports girls to complete secondary school with the skills necessary to negotiate key life decisions. Room to Read focuses on girls transitioning to secondary school because that is where the biggest—and most permanent—gaps in gender equality in education take place. We do this by creating more girl-friendly school environments, providing female mentorship and life skills training to assist girls in making informed life decisions, and financially supporting girls to attend and remain in school through graduation.

Our Model

Invest locally. We hire and empower local teams to run our in-country operations, and we partner with local communities and challenge them to co-invest in each project. This ensures their active participation and sense of ownership.

Build community capacity. We ensure we are always contributing to growing the capacity of the local community. For example, in our book publishing program, we hold workshops with local authors and illustrators empowering a growing pool of local talent to develop quality reading materials.

Improve program quality.

We continuously track our programs through ongoing research, monitoring and evaluation. For example, during the first three years

after a library is established, site visits are conducted every three months to assess progress; offer needed training; and provide additional books and educational materials.

Manage efficiently and effectively.

We ensure maximum investment in our programs. For every \$1 Room to Read receives, 83 cents goes directly to programs. We also maintain a diversified donor base with 41 percent of our funding coming from outside North America.

Create a global movement. We have over 46 chapters in 16 countries and over 14,000 volunteers that network, plan events, and raise awareness for Room to Read.

Our Reach

Room to Read currently operates in 10 countries throughout Asia and Africa.
