Shine For Kids

In the last year or so our Club has become aware that too many worthwhile charities travel "under the radar." It seems that the bigger, the more celebrity supporters there are, the more money that a charity can raise.

Yet as our guest speakers last Monday, Dennis Van Someren of the Rotary Club of Kenthurst and Gloria Larman, CEO of "Shine" demonstrated so clearly, celebrity done not necessarily equal value or importance.

Shine is a charity dedicated to providing support to children whose parents are in the Australian prison

system and Dennis opened the presentation with the startling information that he started as a volunteer with Shine over 30 years because "my dad was in jail." As he said, it doesn't matter where you live, when a parent is in jail the family unit never really recovers – but the children can.

Dennis made it clear that in this there are no grey areas; you either sink or swim and with the emotions, the desolation, the sense of loss that a child goes through it's hard to swim alone. A child needs a mentor and guidance. Unfortunately with our political system conditioned to look for three year "fixes" very few consider the long term damage that is being done and the long term savings that can be made. In this world of budget constraints saving one child from repeating the "sins of the father" saves the state at least

After Dennis' emotional appeal it was up to Gloria to put the nuts and bolts of Shine together. At this stage Shine has some 30 staff and around 300 volunteers but they need lots more. To give some idea of the dimension of the problem, the most recent data available (2004 – and the lack of current data is, in itself a problem) over 60,000 children, around 5%, experience parental incarceration and that these children are 5 times more likely to become prisoners themselves. Even more confronting is that 20% of the children are Aboriginal.

The name "Shine" is an acronym for what the charity does – Support, Hope, Inspire, Nurture, Empower. It was started in 1982 arising from a NSW Parliamentary Enquiry but had a slow early growth until 2000 when it extended its operations to Bathurst. In 2009 it extended to Victoria and in 2012 ACT. In 2013 Shine established its first social enterprise, the "Shine Café" where exprisoners and children of prisoners are taught hospitality skills.

Gloria spelled out the consequences of parental imprisonment – it breaks up families, increases caring responsibilities, leads to poor educational outcomes, shame, emotional distress, financial disadvantage and ultimately instability and hopelessness.

Shine seeks to overcome this by providing child-friendly environments, assisting with prison in-visits, developing child and family centres, mentoring, support transport, educational support, school holiday activities and career support and particularly targeting Aboriginal and Torrens Strait Islander support.

Shine runs on a total budget of around \$3million, of which half is provided by government and the balance raised by donations and fund-raising activities and both Dennis and Gloria made an appeal to Ku-ring-gai Rotary to consider Shine when thinking of which charities to support in future.
