Lifeline Gambling help

Gambling Help

Lifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury is funded by the Responsible Gambling Fund to provide a Gambling Help service on Sydney's north shore. The LLH2H Gambling Help service includes a face-to-face personal counselling service, a face-to-face financial counselling service and a group treatment program.

The Responsible Gambling Fund (RGF)was established in 1995 by NSW Government (OLGR). Funded by 2% Gaming levy paid by Casino.

LLH2H Gambling Help Service includes 6 LGA's: Ku-ring-gai, Hornsby, Willoughby, Ryde, North Sydney, Lane Cove.

The service is FREE for gamblers, family members and friends

Gambling Help also provides a Gambling Helpline: 1800 858 858 (24/7); a Gambling Help website: gamblinghelp.nsw,gov.au; Self-help tools: workbooks, DVD's, phone apps, social media; Gamblinghelponline.org.au

The most popular form of gambling is poker machines and there are more poker machines in NSW than any other state. Sports betting is the fastest growing form of gambling in Australia;

Race betting is more than 3x larger than the sports betting market in Australia.

Gambling is increasingly becoming the domain of the young and is targeted mostly at young men.

Access to gambling is available by person, by phone or by the internet. Advertisements are online, on tv, in sporting environments; Online gambling businesses are highly visible;

A significant contributing factor to problem gambling is the availability of and access to gambling opportunities.

Prevalence: Survey results suggest approximately 400,000 Australian adults experience moderate to significant problems from their gambling, (Productivity Commission Report, 2010) (Approx. 2%).

18-24 year olds are more likely to experience problems (particularly males) and make up 40% of all problem gamblers; Up to 5% will develop a problem by 25;

It is the 'addiction' that is hardest to identify as there are few physical symptoms. Only 5 - 10 % of problem gamblers seek help.

Lifeline Gambling help continued

Gambling Research Australia definition: "Problem gambling is characterised by difficulties in limiting money and /or time spent on gambling which leads to adverse consequences for the gambler, others, or for the community."

The following screen, *The Problem Gambling Severity Index* is used to determine whether gambling is a problem:

Do you bet more than you can afford to lose?

Do you need to gamble with more money to get the same feeling of excitement?

Do you go back another day to try to win back the money you lost?

Have you borrowed money or sold anything to get money to gamble?

Do you feel like you have a problem with gambling?

Has gambling caused you health problem, including stress or anxiety?

Have people criticised your gambling, regardless of whether or not you thought it was true?

Has you gambling caused any financial problems for you or your household?

Have you felt guilty about the way you gamble or what happens when you gamble?
