Guest speaker Claudia Moratti



Claudia Moratti was RCK's guest speaker on Monday 12th September and she dazzled us with insights into the ripeness of avocados and the squeeziness of kiwifruit.

Claudia is one of the team of students from Sydney University entered in the 2016 "International Genetically Engineered Machine Competition, known as iGEM for

short.

Members will recall that our fellow Rotarian, Matty Mahjoub, was part of the 2015 iGEM team. Matty's project was to create genetically engineered cells to produce needed medical supplies such as insulin however Claudia and her team have taken a different tack.

How do you tell when an avocado is ripe? That's right, you squeeze it. This bruises the fruit and leads to large amounts of spoilage. Yet judging ripeness ought to be simple because as fruit such as avocados ripen they emit ethylene which should be easy to detect. It's not.

And that's only the beginning of the problem. When ripening fruit emits eth-

ylene it triggers accelerated ripening by surrounding fruit, hence the expression “one bad apple spoils the barrel.” Indeed, one bad kiwifruit or avocado can spoil an entire shipment. As Claudia pointed out, with some fruit such as bananas it’s simple to see when a piece is over-ripe but with kiwifruit and many varieties of avocado this is almost impossible.

The high-tec. solution employs gas chromatography but this is expensive so there is a simpler way – squeeze a sample of the fruit, and in bulk fruit handling companies at places like the Sydney Markets that’s exactly what they do. There are people actually employed to squeeze kiwifruit and avocados. The spoilage is very large.

The Sydney University iGem team is searching for an alternative by developing a cell based biosensor based on a bacteria found in a lake in NSW. The bacteria with the catchy name of NBB4 is sensitive to ethylene and by splicing it into common and easy to use bacterium, a benign member of the ecoli family, the team hopes to develop a simple sticker that can be attached to each piece of fruit that tells purchasers and intermediate handlers when the fruit is ripe.

Claudia cautions that although they are making good progress there’s a long way to go yet and quite a few hurdles to overcome, not the least being public caution over the use of genetically modified material and, as one member suggested during questions, the use of a medium, ecoli, popularly associated with food poisoning.

But it’s hard to understate the potential for the technology and the meeting concluded with the almost unanimous resolution never to take a squeezed avocado lightly again.

ATTENDANCE SYSTEM: Handy Hint

If you have entered a period of absence and decide to attend the club BEFORE the period has ended, you click “Attending” [Save] and a “P” appears beside your name for the next meeting. BUT... the overlapping period of absence still shows beside your name which is confusing.

Any member can easily fix it

- If you are correcting it for another member, first click on the person’s name, to bring it to the top of the pag
- enter the CORRECT period of absence – with a finish date the date of the PREVIOUS Monday press [Save]
- Scroll down to check the result. You should see the dates of the period of absence disappear, because the program deletes periods of absence in the ‘past’
